CLEVELAND POLICE BRING MARINE BAND TO PORT STANLEY

One of the Season's Record Crowds Expected at Erie Lakeside Today.

The magnificent marine band of the Cleveland police department will make its first appearance in Canada at Port Stanley this afternoon in a two-hour concert which will feature the celebration of the half holiday.

The Cleveland authorities with great reluctance yielded to appeals to depart from the rule which restrains the musicians from going beyond the boundaries of the state of Ohio.

One of the greatest picnic crowds of the season will come from Northern Ohio, and special attractions of a high order are being provided.

Expectations are that today's special attractions will draw one of the greatest crowds of the season to the Port Stanley, and arrangements for their convenient accommodation are being made by the L. & P. S. R.
