At the regular meeting of the Victoria Hospital Board on Saturday, Dr. H. Meek, chief of the gynecological department, tendered his resignation, which was accepted by the board. Dr. Robert Ferguson was unanimously appointed in his place. Dr. Meek was placed on the consulting staff of the same department.

T. H. Heard submitted the monthly report for January as follows: Number of patients admitted, 372; discharged, 336; births, 18; deaths, 24; patients treated in the free dispensary, 402. The receipts for the month were \$10,726.50, and the disbursements \$10,726.50 were paid by the board.

The members of the board who were present were Col. W. M. Gartschore, James Gray, J. W. Laidlaw and T. H. Heard.
A resolution to send a letter of condolence to Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hoath on the death of their daughter, Margaret, a nurse-in-training at Victoria Hospital, was passed. The board attended Mrs. Hoath's funeral in a body on Sunday afternoon.

The third quarterly official meeting of the First Methodist Church was held Friday night. Rev. Dr. Peever reviewed the many activities of the church for the quarter and showed they had been extraordinary. FAIR BOARD TAKES UP THE MATTER OF EXTENDING GROUNDS

Matter Is Left With Executive Committee.

EXTENSION NECESSARY

Board Agreed On This Point, But Differ As To Time To Make Move.

Temporary expansion eastward by purchasing land held under option, or westward by purchasing property at the rear of the present grounds, was recommended at a meeting of the Western Fair Association Saturday night. Both propositions were referred to the executive committee.

Neither of these plans would be adopted as a permanent measure, but would be intended to relieve the congestion of the grounds until plans are made. The majority of the board seemed agreed that new grounds must be obtained, but differed as to the proper time for commencing such a venture.

A report of the executive committee was read, in which it was recommended that all the options on land east of the grounds be purchased, and the finance committee instructed to consider means of financing the proposition.

George McCormick thought that this proposal, if carried out, would leave no room for money. Let the present one be adopted as a permanent measure, and the board would be in the position of having to ask both the city and the Government for money. Arthur T. Little asked whether, if this plan were adopted, it was the intention to purchase the remainder of the land along the east side of the grounds. If not, it would be better to purchase the whole lot of 90 acres east of Hiale street and south of Trafalgar. This, he said, was level, sandy land, had good railway connections. Little stated that the matter of a site was a small question. Another site not further from the city limits and with car connections would cost only \$40,000. The real problem was putting up new buildings. The grandstand would have to be doubled in size, as only a portion of the present stand could be moved. The whole work would cost about a million and a quarter dollars. The buildings would all have to be erected immediately, as it would be impossible to carry on the fair without them.

Not Practicable Now.
Lieut.-Col. Gartschore, who presided, stepped out of the chair to state that he never could be convinced that extension eastward was desirable. He had always been in favor of a new site, but thought that it could not be financed now, although it might be possible in a few years. He suggested getting permission from the city to build horse barns on the west side of Hiale street. This would afford temporary relief, later by selling the ground not specified for parks purposes it would be possible to obtain enough money to proceed with new grounds with the help of provincial and federal government grants. The remainder of the plan could be financed by bonds guaranteed by the city. The extra revenue from the larger grounds would be sufficient to pay the interest and sinking fund on these.

Extension to the east financed by the board itself would cripple the association financially, he believed. George McCormick said the suggestion to build barns on Egerton street was a good one, but it could be stopped by any one citizen who wished to get an injunction against it.

Lieut.-Col. Robert McEwen said that ultimately new grounds would be obtained, and the less money expended on extensions now, the better. No action was taken on the suggestion to change the name of the association so that "London" would be included in it.

Estimates of the finance committee were presented. It is expected that the annual receipts for the year will be \$25,000 and the grandstand receipts \$12,500. The total receipts for 1920 are estimated at \$38,000 with expenditures of \$25,000.

The executive was empowered to consider printing a catalogue each year and a date for closing the fair, so that this could be issued in time for the opening of the exhibition.

Permission was given to H. J. Clark, resident engineer for the government road, to store concrete mixers in the fair ground buildings temporarily.
