HOSPITAL NURSES TO HAVE MORE ROOM

\$20,000 May Be Granted for Extension of Building—The Day's Doings.

HAMILTON, Ont., Nov. 5.—(Special.)—Pensions to the meeting of the finance committee this evening, Mayor Stewart and George C. Copley had a heated dispute as to the extension of the City Hospital building. The police commissioners yesterday in failing to turn up to receive the moral department, Mr. Copley said the appointment had been made in writing two weeks ago. The mayor declared that he did not know that the appointment had been made in writing. "Sleeping like pigs," was the way Chairman Bailey of the finance committee described the condition of the City Hospital nurses, the idea being to accommodate in a couple of small houses, and it was agreed to submit a bylaw next January, asking the ratepayers to vote \$20,000 for an addition to the hospital. The sum of \$124 will be paid to the Niagara Power Union. The Sheffield choir will give a civic reception on Thursday evening, and be taken to drive around the city Wednesday morning. A recommendation was sent on to the council asking that steps be taken to stop the board of works from increasing its overdraft of \$25,000. A committee was named to work with representatives of the charitable organizations with the object of establishing a municipal lodging house in the customs house building on Stuart-street, the idea being to make applicants for charity cut wood or break stone to pay the aid given.

There is a pipe line in the Natural Gas Co.'s pipe line and the pressure in the mains was very low for over an hour this evening.

Board of Education.

The internal management committee of the board of education this evening appointed a committee to patch up a quarrel between Principal Hill and Canteaker Fuller of the King Edward School. The salaries of Misses Burrows and Montgomery of the model school staff were raised to \$550. A plot of ground will be purchased for a playground in connection with the Hess-street school.

The arrangement of the city conducted the celebration in honor of the 33rd anniversary of the discovery of the telephone by a banquet. C. H. Plimpton presided.

MANSLAUGHTER VERDICT IN THE INGERSOLL CASE

Italian Who Killed Companion Sunday Will Be Sentenced To-day—Tillsburg Arson Case Begins

WOODSTOCK, Nov. 5.—(Special.)—Michael Ponzoni on Sunday afternoon last slew a companion at Ingersoll with a stone, on Monday was captured at Dorchester Station, on Tuesday night was adjudged guilty of murder by a coroner's jury, on Wednesday had a true bill returned against him by the criminal assize grand jury, which happened, standing in the car door, found guilty of manslaughter by the assize jury. Justice Magge will pass sentence to-morrow.

Three boys, Richard Davey, Charles Pilon and Wm. Douglas, saw the tragedy, and were called by the crown. They saw that Constantine, who was killed, standing in the car door, apparently quarrelling with an old man, Antonice, standing on the ground below. Antonice threw a piece of coal at Constantine through the open door. Constantine jumped down and grabbed the old man by the arms from behind. Then the prisoner jumped out of another car, picked up a flat stone which had been used as a marker in a game of coppers, and ran towards Constantine. The deceased ran, and Ponzoni threw the stone, striking Constantine on the back of the head. It appeared that the trouble in the gang started when Antonice and a brother of the murdered man began drinking beer together.

RUMPUIS IN ECUADOR.

Congress is Riotous Over Charges of Fraud.

QUITO, Ecuador, Nov. 5.—The extraordinary session of the Ecuadorian congress, which included a second riotous scene that ended in a serious fight, a number of the ministers, and a number of the members of the cabinet, were warmly attacked by the minority in the house, who accused them of being responsible for the extensive fraud. The supporters of the government retaliated by assaulting the minority deputies, with the result of leaving the congress, many of whom were wounded in the encounter.

4 BEARS FOR THE ZOO.

MINISTER'S TRAGIC DEATH

After laborious Sabbath's Work of Deaths Aways Suddenly.

LONDON, Nov. 5.—The circumstances of the death of Rev. Wm. Penhall, the Methodist minister, who died at his home on the Moncton Circuit, near Stratford, are unusual.

While his life was slipping away at 2 o'clock on Monday, afternoon his quarters were waiting for him at the other end of the circuit, and as they dispersed the news of his death came Sunday Mr. Penhall preached morning, afternoon and evening, each at his three appointments, driving completely around the circuit, a distance of 46 miles. He administered the sacrament twice, and held quarterly meeting three times, returning to his home about 10 o'clock.

Monday morning he assisted his wife with the washing, hitched up his horse, drove three miles and back to pray with a sick parishioner, arriving back at home at noon. While his wife was preparing the midday meal he went down cellar to fix the furnace, and fell over unconscious just as he reached the bottom of the stairs. He died an hour later, without regaining consciousness.

SCOTT LOSES FIRST ROUND.

Judge Denies Application for Transferring Trial.

REGINA, Sask., Nov. 5.—(Special.)—The plea entered by Premier Scott in a case brought against him by H. W. Laird that the court at Regina had not jurisdiction to try the criminal libel charge was thrown out by Judge Johnstone this morning, the court stating that the attorney-general's department had preferred the charge and could lay it anywhere in the province.

Scott had contended that as the alleged offence took place in Moosejaw Judicial District, it must be tried there. To this the judge would not agree.

Counsel for the premier asked time to file a plea of justification, and the judge allowed him till to-morrow morning. Counsel for Laird is given the right to apply immediately for particulars of the case.

A charge was made by the premier during the recent provincial campaign reflecting on Laird's conduct in the city council in connection with certain unratified contracts.
