## IS IT DOLLAR WHEAT FOR ONTARIO FARMERS?

A Review of Crop Conditions in Ontario, Showing Value of Spraying Fruit Trees and Potatoes, While Reports Speak of Wheat Fields Being Sold Near London Already—The Outlook is Excellent.

Crops in Ontario are looking extremely well. A trip overland across central Ontario shows that while the season was late, the conditions of growth have been good since and that the outlook for all the cereal crops is first-class. In some sections, especially around Lindsay and on the heavier clay lands in other counties, the wet spring delayed seeding very much, but the growth since then has been marvelous. The oats are looking very well, and the wheat will be slightly less than that of a year ago. Peas are promising much and there is a fairly large acreage of a year ago. Barley is perhaps the weakest crop of all the cereals. Barley cannot stand a cold soil and the delay in spring's work told more against this cereal than against others. The white grub is working in some sections seriously and some fields show a sickly white leaf, but on the whole there will be a big yield as the acreage is slightly in excess of last year. It is one of the most pleasant things in the farmer's eye to see how a poor looking catch crop has spread out and developed into a thick stand of deep green wheat. This new wheat the greatest miracle of the growing season will be seen in the ears of servers of country fields. The ears of wheat are preparing to shoot and with the passing of a few days the transformation will be complete. Ontario's wheat is being canvassed for a sale of wheat fields in advance. It looks like a big price for the opening market. Already preparations are being made in the wheat harvest and binders will be humming their next week. ### BEES SWARMING.

June is the month in which the bees may be expected to swarm. A lack of ventilation, an overcrowded hive and large stores of honey are the principal causes for this swarming. It is not a difficult matter to control the swarming by supplying ample bottom ventilation for the hives and plenty of storage room for the honey. Shade is essential in order to keep the hives cool. If the hives do not stand in the shade of a tree or in some sheltered position, an awning or board platform should be constructed over it to ward off the sun's rays.

By clipping the wings of the queen many swarms will be prevented. When this is done the bees may swarm, but they will not get far away from the hive. To clip the queen's wings, lift out the comb on which she is resting, slip off a piece of each wing with a pair of manicure scissors and return her to the hive. When the queen swarms the queen will be found near the hive. As the queen cannot fly away the bees will soon return to their hive again.

### GARDEN PARTY FOR JERSEYS.


