

SHORTAGE OF LABOR IN MUNITION PLANTS

Report Submitted to Meeting
of Resources Committee
Yesterday.

CO-OPERATION NEEDED

Understanding Desired Be-
tween Employers and Mili-
tary Authorities.

A detailed report of labor conditions in Toronto munition plants was submitted at the meeting of the organization of resources committee at the parliament buildings yesterday, when there were present the lieutenant-governor, Sir John Hendrie, the premier, Hon. J. W. Garfield, C. M. Bowdler, M.L.A., and Severin Ducharme, M.L.A. The report was based upon an investigation of a number of the larger plants made by the secretary and assistant secretary of the committee, Dr. A. H. Abbott and B. J. Roberts, respectively.

The investigation confirms the general opinion that there is a considerable shortage of labor in these plants. This is naturally particularly felt in connection with skilled labor, such as toolmakers and skilled mechanics, but an almost equal need is felt for general laborers, says the report as handed to the press by Dr. Abbott.

The shortage of labor has given rise to many minor labor troubles, and a constant shifting of men from one establishment to another. These conditions naturally operate to lessen the production of munitions. It would be a great help if patriotic workers could fully understand this and co-operate with the manufacturers as to increase the output of munitions to the highest possible point. It should be borne in mind that the men who really suffer because of these conditions are those who are facing the enemy in the trenches.

Co-Operation Lacking.
A general lack of co-operation between recruiting sergeants and manufacturers was also found, and it would seem wise if in future recruiting campaigns some understanding could be reached by which men who are essential to the manufacture of munitions could be regarded as not subject to be called for enlistment. They are evidently doing their best service for the nation at the present time in producing munitions.

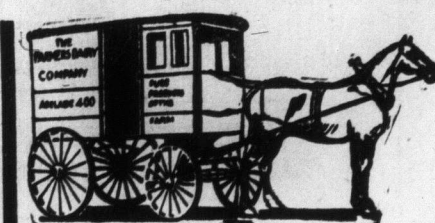
The labor stringency is being met by manufacturers in various ways; by the training of inexperienced men and women.

What It Will Mean to the
Average Family

Prices of bread, meat, tea and other foods and drinks have shared in the rise in price arising out of the war, but the Farmers' Dairy milk has been reduced to its former summer price—22 cents for 12. This makes it possible for the average family to give milk a larger place in its daily menu.

The City Health Authorities have set a standard, below which no dairy must allow the percentage of cream in their milk to go. A large percentage of Toronto families are getting high-quality cream by using the milk with the deep cream line.

PLANS FOR BIG PICTURE

ABANDONED THRU WAR

Sailing Craft Necessary for "Sir H. Morgan, Buccaneer," Unobtainable.

The war has affected the motion picture business in a novel manner, aside from the question of photographic supplies and chemicals. When Rolin Sturgeon, director-general of the western Vitaphone, planned to produce "Sir Henry Morgan, Buccaneer," by Cyrus Townsend Brady, he found that the sailing craft necessary for the picture was not obtainable.

All the Pacific ports have been combed and old hulks formerly thought useless have been put back in the carrying trade, either on long time contracts or at such high charges that their use for pictures was prohibitive. Even the old schooner, "Alden Bessie," standby of producers for hundreds of marine scenes, is sailing along the South American coast. Sturgeon has been forced to lay his plans aside until shipping conditions moderate.
