BRITISH forces kept up their pressure against the Germans at two separate points yesterday, against the Hindenburg line and against the triangle with its apex in Comines. Attacking the enemy at dawn in the high ground northwest of Bullecourt they captured a section of line stubbornly defended by a strong garrison. Heavy losses befel the enemy and 43 surrendered as prisoners of war. In their attack from Messines towards Comines, on the front between the River Lys and the Ypres-Comines Canal, the British speedily overcame the Germans, and they gained the whole of their objectives. They launched their effort from points south and east of Messines and astride the Ypres-Comines Canal. This, with
