PROGRESS IS MADE BY NATIONAL TRUST

Large Increase in Assets and Gain in Profits Shown in Annual Report.

A large increase in assets, evidence of the steady growth, year by year, of public confidence, is shown in the report of the National Trust Company for the year ended Dec. 31 last. Total assets are set forth at \$88,941,000, as compared with \$80,091,000 at the end of the previous twelvementh, an advance of \$3,850,000, Net profits for 1919 amounted to \$281,000, as against \$266,000 in the previous year. RICH SHOWINGS ON MUNROE PROPERTY

Patient Wait of Famous Discoverer and Partners Promises to Be Rewarded.

The active plan of development plan-ned for the Jack Munroe property of Elk Lake is expected to start some time before the end of the present month and arrangements are being made accord-

Jack Munroe is located near Elk

Lake, Ontario, in the township of James, three miles southeast of the town of Elk Lake, and two miles from the rail-Elk Lake, and two miles from the ran-way.

This property has an unusual show-ing of native silver on the surface and a shaft has been sunk on one of the veins to a depth of about 50 feet. There are ten veins in all, and the entire num-ber can be cross-cut within a distance of less than 400 feet from the present shaft. There is ample wood and water for development purposes and a fairly good road to the property.

The property was discovered and staked by Jack Munroe and his partners in 1908, creating quite a little sensasion

The property was discovered and staked by Jack Munroe and his partners in 1908, creating quite a little sensation at the time on account of the richness of the ore and the showings uncovered. At that time the nearest railway point was Latchford, 56 miles below on the Montreal River. Provisions had to be taken in by cance and packs from the same point. Silver was low thenaround 47c to 50c an ounce—and had to be shipped to New Jersey. In spite of the value of the ore, the thing was hardly practical under the circumstances, at least not in a big way. The partners heard the railway was going to be built to Elk Lke and decided to patent the property and wait for transportation. When the railway was built it was the intention to open up the property and plans were formulated to that end, but the war broke out and Mr. Munroe enlisted, and the results of his participation in the fighting caused the decision to form a company instead of continuing it as a private enterprise. At his own suggestion he has retained a substantial interest and has cheerfully volunteered the full benefit of his own knowledge and experience.

The outcrop of native silver near the shaft is undoubtedly one of the finest showings in that section, and the movement and shearing shown indicate ore bodies of large size as well as the ore itself showing high quality.

Arrangements completed by the company provide for \$120.000 for a mining plant and actual ground development, and still provide for a reserve beyond that amount of 500,000 shares of treasury stock to be permanently held in the treasury if practicable.

Precautions are being taken against mistakes in the equipping and development, and to this end the most thoroly competent men possible are being engaged as mining engineer and mining superintendent.
