FOURTEEN ARRESTS IN THE LAST THREE DAYS

Police Court Bench This Morning Held Fourteen Persons Who Were Summarily Dealt With.

Fourteen arrests were made in the city on Saturday, Sunday and this morning—Newton Wilbur, Charles Booth, Hugh McCarthy, William Kiley, James West, Frank Hopper, John McGoney, Harkness Thompson and Peter Yapp, were fined \$8 or two months in jail for drunkenness.

Joseph Pierce created a disturbance in his father-in-law's house on Brunelles street yesterday and was ejected. Later he was arrested for drunkenness and fined \$8 this morning.

Beth McLeod, a pugilist, who was sworn in as an exhibition policeman on Saturday night, was arrested for drunkenness on King Square was fined \$8 or two months in jail.

Michael Kelly, an habitual drunkard, endeavored to escape being fined by denying the usual charge. Special Officer Oliver testified that Kelly was intoxicated and used profanity on Reel's Point yesterday afternoon.

The journey to the South End lock-up was beset with many vicissitudes as Kelly proved very refractory and several byes declined to assist the special policeman.

In court Kelly claimed he was sober and further insisted that he took to the central police station early, this morning one of the permanent policemen informed him that P. B. Buchanan, the fish merchant, refused to interfere when he (Kelly) was taken into custody, declaring the prisoner was not drunk. Kelly was summoned to permit him to secure evidence which will substantiate his tale.

James Daley arrested on Sheffield street shortly after one o'clock this morning by Special Officers Etchingham and Buckley being unable to furnish a coherent story for his presence on that select avenue at such an early hour pleaded for leniency but his appeal fell upon deaf ears for an \$8 fine was imposed with the alternative of two months in jail.
