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Mitchell Report breathes the spirit of prosperity: their special services have been seasons of much good in the conversion of souls, and the quickening of believers. The circuit has sustained loss in the removal by death of three of its staunchest members, but they have left a bright testimony behind them that they have gone to be with Christ. The congregations are generally good: their Sebbath Schools were never more prosperous; promising, at no distant day, to prove a good nursery to the Church. Financially the Misssion presents a brighter prospect than for many years. The Missionary meetings were seasons rich with Divine influences, and the receipts are over \$100 in advance of last year. The debt on the Parsonage all paid, and two new sheds erected.

The Report from London says: "A few have professed faith in Christ, and are walking heavenward. Congregations both in the city and country are good. We have commenced cottage prayer-meetings in the city, which we hope will be productive of much good. During the year we have expended in improvements on London Church over \$400, which has been all paid, and a surplus in hand. The contract for the erection of a brick parsonage is let, to be completed this summer at a cost of \$1000. Financially we have exceeded our utmost expectations: our Quarterly receipts are about \$30 and our Missionary receipts over \$80 in excess of last year. The Sabbath Schools require a more efficient and diligent staff of Teachess. To do justice to the city, and open other places in the country, we need a second Preacher.

In Dereham the Societies are reported as living in peace. In the town of Ingersoll 12 have been added to the Society, and the prospects there are very encouraging. A lot of land as a site for a Church, and, if needs be, a Parsonage also, has been purchased at a cost of over \$400: aid from the Conference is

earnestly requested to enable them to build.

The Pastor of Usborne reports a few conversions and the quickening of believers, but feels the need of more Divine influence to secure greater prosperity. The Quarterly and Missionary receipts are in advance of last year. The congregations are good. At Bethany a brick Church is to be completed by next fall. The friends in Bethel have seated and painted their Church, which is free of debt. Eldad Chapel has also been freed from a debt of several years standing; and at Freewill we believe it is contemplated soon to build a place for the worship of God.

The Grey Report expresses regret that so little progress has been made in advancing the interests of the Redeemer's kingdom; nevertheless they have had some refreshing seasons coming from the presence of the Lord. The great want

is more of the spirit and power of religion.

The Colborne Report says: "The year just ended has been one of trial and discipline: we have had much battling with sin and the devil, yet success has attended our efforts in the Lord's vineyard; many souls have sought and found Christ; several of the societies have advanced in spiritual attainments, and are in a better condition than they were twelve months since. The Quarterly receipts are in advance of last year—the missionary money nearly doubled. Steps have been taken to build a new church at Fishers', and for seating the church at Oasis; and about \$80 expended on the Preacher's residence."

The Reports from Prince Edward Island District present the usual features of mission toil—light and shade—hopes and fears—joys and sorrows mingle
