have at least the effect of alarming our ship-owners and colonists, disquieting the present investment of their capital and industry, and embarrassing all their efforts to extend the trade; so much so that the result of former treaties is almost entirely nullified, and the very object of any negotiation with the United States, "The Americans are right; they understand their own interests; and we cannot complain that they pursue it. We are not astonished that no regular should prevent their again proposing to be admitted to the West Indies. The subjects of complaint, of animosity, of despair, to all who cherish colonial interests is, that their proposal is now listened to;—that, after all which has passed, the offer to negotiate having been twice rejected, it, upon the third time of asking, accepted;—that negotiations are actually begun, and in progress, are apparently hastened with such impatience, that though the ultimate effect is what no minister can pretend to foresee, ours are to hear of when too late to be remedied, rather than wait till the calamity can be prevented.

And yet the circumstances under which Government has indicated that they should still adhere to the new act and order, even though the Americans repented their law of 1823, are unchanged—are far more favorable to such an adherence—and, stranger still, the American law of 1823, and the provisions it annexed, till the repeal of which, and for the repeal of which government declared they would not enter into any negotiation, are unrepented—may, are reinforced by acts interdicting the entrance into American ports, and depriving them of their British colonial vessels. Nor is this mentioned merely to show the inconsistency of our government, and the indignity of entering into the present negotiations; but it operates at the same time as a great grievance to the North American colonists, and a most cherished privilege. For it having been understood and published by both governments, that the trade was to be regulated by mutual legislation; and that the repeal of the first and preliminary step must be the repeal of their part of the act of 1823, and that there should be no further negotiation before, the colonists have naturally been looking only to the acts of the American government, and have been embarking in this trade with the greater security (little dreaming of any secret arrangement in Downing Street), as they saw that even if any change was made, the method prescribed would interfere so much time as to enable them to have their representations heard; and if unsuccessfully, enable them in some measure to exercise themselves, and prevent the distress arising from these sudden and extreme changes, by which they have formerly suffered so often and so much.

What temptation it, what irresistible allurements the Americans have invented, to bring government to this sudden revolution, and to parley with them about conceding rights of trade, upon which all negotiation has been so repeatedly declined, cannot, indeed, be exactly known, but from the publicity of the Republican Government may be safely conjectured; and our present purpose is to discuss the probable nature of such inducements, and estimate the importance to the British dominions of the West India trade under the existing system, and the consequence of conceding that trade to the United States. But first it would be well to review the commercial intercourse of these colonies at former periods, and note the changes made, and their results hitherto. For the alteration now proposed is not one of those beautiful theories of free trade, which, no nation before having been so absurd as to apply, or apply by beginning at the wrong end, cannot be contradicted by past experience; but in this case, it is by observing how antipathetic this trade has been, sported with heretofore; and how much the negligence of government has already cost us, how much their facility and concessions, their inconsistency, and sudden and violent changes of policy, it is by comparing these, that we can best judge what we have to gain or lose, by preserving the colonial intercourse upon its present footing, or again surrendering that source of wealth and maritime power to the most aspiring of all rivals.

PRO REG, LEG, ET ORGE.

We have not a single article of later European intelligence than we had last week.

We regret exceedingly to witness so serious a misunderstanding as at present exists between His Majesty's Council and the House of Assembly of Nova-Scotia, arising out of that prolific source of discord, the Revenue Bill. We have endeavored to put our readers in possession of full information on the subject, in as concise a way as possible. It will be seen that the actual matter in dispute is an additional tax on Brandy to the extent of Four-pence per gallon, which His Majesty's Council strenuously resist, but it is the great constitutional principle involved in the question which gives to the controversy the importance attached to it. We are every day increasingly convinced of the necessity of having the separate powers and privileges of these conflicting branches of the Legislature properly defined, as from the frequent recurrence of such alterations in the Colonies, it is too manifest that grounds of misapprehension or misinterpretation on these vital points still exist, and in whatever view we contemplate them such contentions are to the last degree injurious to the interests of the people. It seems to be admitted on all hands that the Representative Body belongs the power of originating all Money Bills, and it is not denied that the privilege of rejecting is possessed by the Council, but the great cause or bone of contention is the modifying or amending power as claimed by the latter. We do not plume ourselves upon the depth of our Parliamentary knowledge, but we have always been accustomed to regard the Legislative Council as a kind of court of review, and if we admit the principle that the greater implies the less, it follows that the power of utterly rejecting must involve the privilege of suggesting alterations, or proposing modifications. But we speak with much deference on a subject by which so many wiser heads have been confounded, and sincerely hope our next accounts will bear to us the tidings of an amicable as well as constitutional adjustment, without the dire alternative of a dissolution of the House, of which we have heard a rumour. Manly the Province suffers incalculably, for while the Legislators are engaged in "high" and angry debate, dutiable articles are landed, and housed in vast quantities free of all the burden of taxation. According to the statement of an honorable Member of the House, £1100 had already been lost to the Province by that means.

Several Public Meetings have been held at Miramichi, for the purpose of adopting measures to make that place a touching Port, in the projected Steam Boat Navigation between Quebec and Halifax. Ninety-seven shares were subscribed, upon condition that the boat touch at the towns of Chatham and Newcastle, each trip.—A Committee of three (Messrs. Joseph Cunard, Thomas H. Peters, and John A. Street, Esquires,) were elected a Committee of Correspondence and Negotiation, who are to correspond with the Committees of Quebec, Montreal, and Halifax, for the purpose of effecting, if possible, the desirable object of having the Boat touch at Miramichi.

NOVA-SCOTIA.—On the 31st ult., the President gave his assent to 27 Acts passed the present session; one of which is "An Act for the relief of His Majesty's Roman Catholic subjects in this Province."—Amount of Duties, &c. collected in the Province last year, £67,157 : 19 : 3. Salaries of the Custom House Officers, Clerks, Waiters, &c. throughout the Province, £8535 : 11 : 6. Salary of the Collector of Halifax, £2000 : Comptroller, £850, &c. Charge for collecting Provincial Revenue, £3555 : 1 : 6.—From a Report of the Committee of the Assembly on the subject of the Halifax Asylum for the Poor, we learn that there are in that Institution 307 paupers, of which 169 are transient, and 138 of the town—137 men, 80 women, and 90 children: there are 37 lame, 8 blind, and 58 in a state of mental deprivation. Divine Service is performed every Lord's day in the Asylum, by a Clergyman of the Church of England; and no restraint is exercised upon any of the paupers, they are allowed to attend, on Sundays, any place of Worship they may prefer. There is a School connected with the Institution, attended by 59 children, which is represented as being a credit to the establishment. Those in a state of madness, lunacy, or idiocy, are placed in a separate building, denominated the "Lunatic Asylum."—Andrew Meuse, Chief of the Micmac Tribe of Indians, has published in the Halifax Royal Gazette, a Card, returning thanks to the Council and Assembly of Nova Scotia, "for their liberality, in granting a sum for which he petitioned to forward the building of a Meeting House for his Tribe at Annapolis." He adds—"he has no doubt that this Grant will be the means of gathering his scattered Tribe together, and probably of preventing the total extermination of a people whose circumstances have driven them to the utmost extremities."

LOWER CANADA.—Mr. Christie has again offered himself as a Representative for the County of Gaspe.—The Legislature have granted £2000 towards erecting the Light House on St. Paul's Island; and £41,941 for Internal Improvements.—It was thought that the Legislature would be prorogued on the 26th ult., after a session of 64 days. Neilson's Gazette says, "a great deal of useful work has been done."

Archibald Menzies, Esquire, of Musquash, and Robert Ellis, Esq. of Tynmouth, were sworn in Magistrates for the City and County of Saint John the former on Tuesday the 30th ult. and the latter on Monday last.—Corier.

Large Sheep.—A half-bred Dishley Sheep, three years old, weighing 95lbs, raised by Jas. Peters, Esq. on the Marsh, was exhibited for sale on our market this morning. It is said to be the largest ever raised in this vicinity.—16.
