Hopes to Have Vaults at Washington for Preserving Records


PAUL SMITH'S, N. Y., Sept. 8-Twenty million Americans visit the 20,282 motion picture theatres of the country every day, paying a grand total of \$1,000,000,000 a year in admissions, Will H.
