TRAFFIC MENACE NEAR KING STREET

Auto Parking in Congested Area There Causes Comment on Danger

Attention has been called to a traffic menace in the vicinity of the head of King street time and again through the press. Again this morning an illustration was provided of the need of the strict application of the regulations. A truck was parked just around the corner of King street in front of a photographer's show-window adjacent to the shoeshine shop. A street car was parked there at the same time thus effectually choking the passage. A string of business cars soon accumulated and it was not until the street car moved that the traffic could be resumed.

It was stated by a bystander this morning that a wholesome lesson might be taught car owners who stall vehicles in these important arteries of traffic, particularly at places where street cars are authorized to use as stations. Furthermore the danger that continues to exist in this vicinity, particularly at the junction of Charlotte and King squares—the old Breeze's Corner location—in case of a fire department turnout with its long sweeping ladder truck, is declared likely to result in tragedy unless auto stalling is rigidly regulated.

FORECLOSURE FOR SCOTIA IS SOUGHT

Manager, Receiver Asked For Company by Eastern Trust at Halifax

HALIFAX, Oct. 29.—A writ was issued this afternoon at the instance of the Eastern Trust Company, Halifax, for the foreclosure of the mortgage securing the bond issue of the Nova Scotia Steel & Coal Co., Ltd. The amount said to be due in respect to the bond issue is \$2,000,000 principal and \$12,500 interest due July 1 last. The writ also asks for the appointment of a manager and receiver of the company. The Eastern Trust Company also petitions for a declaration by the Supreme Court that all the properties and assets of Scotia are covered by the mortgage or deed of trust given to secure its bonds issue.


