TOWN WIPED OUT

Twister Strikes Louisiana, Arkansas, and Missouri, Destroying Many Communities

LATE November tornado, travelling a zig-zag path through portions of Louisiana, Arkansas and Missouri, turned Thanksgiving Day into a day of sorrow for hundreds

of persons. More than fifty were killed, and probably several hundred injured, as the twister tore through several small communities, mowing down scores of homes and disrupting communication. Damage was estimated at several hun-

dred thousand dollars. The storm, apparently an intensification of a disturbance which has been pushing eastward from the Pacific coast, struck with its greatest fury in Central Arkansas, and then moved north through the centre of the state into Missouri, where it brought death and destruction to several widely scattered communities.
