### Report On Child Welfare In City Given At Meeting Of Sub-district Health Board

The report of Miss Leola Richardson and Miss G. Muriel Sadler, nurses in charge of child welfare work, under the sub-district Board of Health in this city, brought out the interesting fact that fully half the children born in this city are under the systematic watch-care of that branch of public health work.

In the month of December 464 babies were visited for a total of 802 visits. Over 800 of these special calls were of an educational character, seven were inspectorial, having to do with babies' boarding homes, six with babies' day camps, and the others were for miscellaneous purposes. There were only three infantile deaths in the supervised group during December, and 74 additions were made to the roster of calls.

The baby clinics were held regularly at the Health Centre, in West Saint John and in the North End.

Miss A. Martina Wallace, dental and pre-school nurse, in reporting on that branch of public health work, told of the 11 dental clinics held in December, 17 new cases, 45 old cases, 34 fillings, 70 treatments, 48 individual patients and 21 home calls. The matter of appointing a local dentist at a salary to give part-time service to the city instead of the gratis services of a number of dentists, was deferred.

Assistant food inspector, Mrs. Marie Furlong Coleman, gave a detailed statement of her round of inspection of shops, eating places, confectionery and soda stores, butcher premises, etc., noting improved conditions in some instances and telling of pressure brought to bear in others.

In December West Saint John had 12 cases at home and eight sent to the hospital, while the city proper had 29 at home and nine in hospital, a total of 38 cases last month, which indicated a marked abatement of the communicable disease.

### Provincial Red Cross to Have Annual Meeting In Saint John on Jan. 25 in 3 Sessions

Arrangements are being made for the annual meeting of the New Brunswick division of the Canadian Red Cross Society to be held in Saint John on Jan. 25, probably in the Admiral Beatty Hotel. Col. J. L. Bigger, chief of the division, will be the guest of honor. The meeting will consist of three sessions, in the morning, afternoon and evening.

Representatives from all parts of the province are expected to attend, and at the meeting the provincial council will function for the first time. The establishment of a provincial council is provided for in the new constitution recently adopted by the New Brunswick division. The council is to be composed of the officers of the division and a representative from every branch in the province. Each branch, at its annual meeting appoints its own representative on the provincial council. At the first meeting of the officers of the division with the representatives of the various branches, five additional members will be elected to complete the council. The full council will appoint the executive, which will consist of the officers and ten other members.

It is expected that the annual meeting will be one of considerable importance, as the future work of the society in this province will be under discussion.
