Copeland Made Health Survey.

"Last summer," said Dr. Copeland. "I made a survey which took me to the team of moder in Poland. This gave me first-hand information of conditions. there.

"Seven hostile armies passed through Poland, and many points were occupied wenty times during the war. After that the Poles had a three-year war with the Russian Bolsheviki. When the Russians were finally driven out of eastern Poland they destroved every building, took away the flocks.
