## **ESTIMATES FOR** LIGHTS AND FERRY

Estimates for street lighting and for the ferry department were presented for approval at this morning's committee meeting of the common council. That for street lighting was presented by Commissioner Thornton and showed an increase of \$786.49 over last year. The estimates for the ferry department, presented by Commissioner Bullock, called for an increase of about \$11,000. The totals were as follows:—

1920 1919

Lighting ...... \$ 42,126.85 \$41,85.86 Ferry ...... 110,150.00 99,168.00

Part of the increase in both cases is due to the fact that the cost of assessing and collecting has been increased from 21-8 per cent to 8 per cent.

Commissioner Fisher said that his estimates last year exceeded expenditure by \$1,304. The revenue last year was about \$40,000, while this year he expected \$45,000. He pointed out that the expenditure for coal and salaries alone amounted to \$57,000. Included in this year's estimate was an item of \$6,000 covering increases in salaries in the department, according to a scale which had been received from the City Public Service Employes' Union.

It was decided to discuss the estimates when all had been submitted, and it was expected that meetings would be held morning and afternoon during the week until they were disposed of. The committee is meeting again this afternoon and tomorrow morning the weekly council meeting will be held on account of the meeting of the Municipal Council in the afternoon.
