Find Influenza Is Epidemic Pneumonia

N. Y. Health Department Announcement Gives Instructions in Ways to Avoid the Infection

(New York Times, Friday.)

In a bulletin issued by the New York City Department of Health the announcement was made that the so-called Spanish influenza is in reality an epidemic of pneumonia.

"The disease," the bulletin said, "is a peculiar form of pneumonia of an epidemic type. It is not a cold, but a very serious disease, and is caused by a germ which causes it being passed from the sick to the well by contact."

After a description of the symptoms of the disease the bulletin said:

"There is nothing alarming in the present increase of the disease, which is a very favorable for its spread. The enormous population of New York city, with its intimate and frequent contact with its neighbors, makes it wonderful that the disease has been kept so long in its present bounds."

The bulletin gives these instructions as to how to avoid contracting the disease:

"Don't crowd. Don't worry. Don't jam the entrances of railway, theatres, and public places."

"Don't touch anything into your mouth. Don't eat or drink in dirty places."

"Don't expose yourself to cold or wet. Don't go out if feeling ill. Take care. Keep it."

"Don't forget to use handkerchiefs, covering your mouth when coughing or sneezing."

"Don't eat without first washing the hands."

For the twenty-four hours that ended at ten o'clock yesterday morning, 10,000 cases of influenza were reported to the Department of Health and forty-four cases of pneumonia. Seven of the latter cases are known to have died.

Of the influenza cases reported, sixty are in Manhattan, 147 in Westchester, 100 in Dutchess, 100 in Richmond, three in Queens, and eleven in Brooklyn.

The report also gives in detail the period of time six deaths from influenza and eleven from pneumonia.

Health Commissioner Copeland said yesterday that unless conditions improved it would be necessary to call upon the Administration to order the distribution of coal and to permit the heating of homes before Nov. 1.

He said that if the disease continued to spread he might have to order cars run with open windows for the sake of the country and to prevent the spread of the disease.
