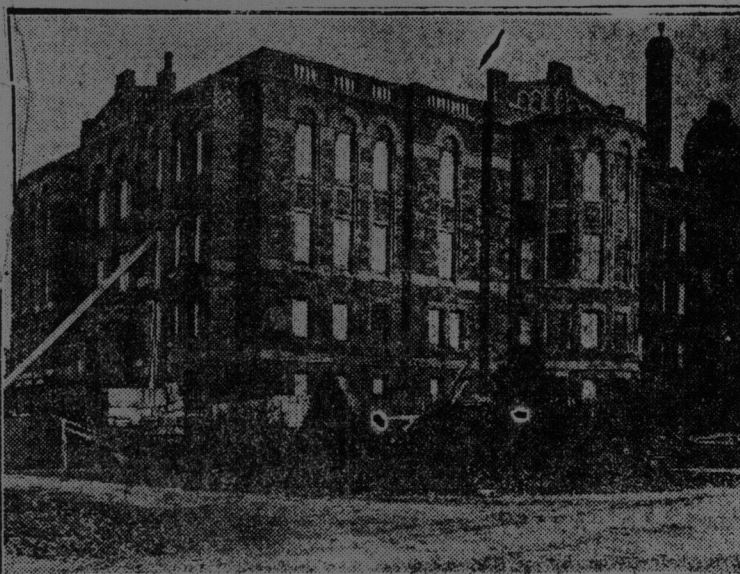

## WAR HAS HAD NO EFFECT ON TRADE IN THE MEDITERRANEAN

Road to Suez Has Been Kept  
Practically Free From  
Interruption

Little Trouble Anticipated—British  
Steamship Men Have New Interest  
Now in Opening of the  
Route via the Panama Canal

London, Nov. 12.—It is remarkable how little difference the naval operations in the Mediterranean have made to the conduct of the passenger trade with the east. It is as well that it is so, for the period of the year is important so far as outward traffic through the Suez Canal is concerned. The Indian passenger season, which may be said to have already begun, is bound to represent heavier loadings than usual, in view of the danger at Delhi. Despite the Italian incursion into Tripoli and the naval skirmishing to which it has given rise, the road to Suez is absolutely without interruption. As to the question of lights in the Red Sea, it seems conceivable that too much importance has been attached to the action of the belligerents. There has been no indication as yet that the absence in the Red Sea lights, under Turkish or Italian control, has presented any serious obstacle to navigation, or even caused any appreciable delay.

It is in November that the Egyptian season commences, and there is every reason to suppose that the popularity of this approved winter resort will suffer no diminution. The Americans each year find themselves more and more drawn to the land of the Pharaohs, and the arrangements of both the White Star and the Cunard companies again contemplate the placing, in the New York-Alexandria services, of some of the biggest liners afloat. Even on the assumption that the Russo-Italian war runs into the winter months, it is now pretty clear that its interference with winter programmes for the Mediterranean will be strictly limited.

Some leading British companies are already laying their plans in anticipation of the opening of the Panama Canal. It may seem early to take such work in hand, but as a matter of fact, it is necessary, if it is to be done properly, a good deal of examination. What is in prospect is, apparently, a complete revolution in the shipping trade between Europe and the vast Pacific seaboard of North and South America.

In former days this long voyage trade was almost exclusively in the hands of sailing ships. Then the tramp steamers began to compete for business, even with distant San Francisco, and so to upset all established notions. Now, with the opening of the Isthmus of Panama, the liners will evidently endeavor to sweep the field. Necessarily this involves minute inquiry into trade possibilities, and careful consideration of the claims and the accommodation of the various parts from Vancouver to Valparaiso. To steamship companies unacquainted with the trade of the Pacific coast, it is to all intents and purposes like a venture into new world. But the enterprise is rendered the less formidable by the knowledge that the Panama Canal will of itself create commerce just as did the Suez waterway. While, too, the eye pictures big fleets of steamers coming from North and South Pacific ports to pass through the Panama waterway, the reflection is inevitable that this short cut from ocean to ocean will bring new life to Central America and to the West Indies, as well as to some parts of the United States.

### Disease Among Portland Horses

"The Portland men who own horses have a good deal to be thankful for," remarked Commissioner of Agriculture Buckley on Friday. "The disease which has been spreading among the horses in the city and by quarantine of all horses exposed to the disease, the danger that the disease will spread has been practically eliminated."

Upon being asked to give an opinion as to how the disease was introduced to Portland, Mr. Buckley said:—

"Some of the veterinarians interested thought that it was carried in the grain that came from away somewhere, but I don't know. It is impossible to tell. We know we have cleaned all the fountains and everything else that is likely to carry the disease, and will hope for the best."

At a meeting of the executive committee, Colonel Lowther, the governor-general's military secretary, explained that His Royal Highness was
