WANT LAYMEN IN THE ALLIANCE

Annual Meeting Today Elects Rev. D. Hutchinson President of Evangelical Organization

The annual meeting of the Evangelical Alliance was held in St. Andrew's church schoolroom this morning. The President, H. R. Read, presided, and there were present Messrs. J. H. A. Anderson, Archdeacon Raymond, W. F. Gault, H. R. Thorne, W. W. Bennett, H. Westworth, J. Ross, J. J. Pinkerton, J. C. B. Appel, Harold Rowe and Robert Smith. The Rev. D. Hutchinson was elected President.

The principal matter under discussion this morning was that of allowing laymen to join the alliance. It has been felt, for some time, that the work of the alliance would be done better if a large membership were taken in. The matter was thoroughly discussed, and it was ultimately decided to try to secure as many of the laymen as possible during the week of prayer to join. The alliance has heretofore been attended only by the clergymen. It was also decided that the alliance should conduct a few more evening services.

The report of the secretary contained a summary of the work done by the alliance during the year, and the matters and papers that were discussed throughout the year. The financial statement showed that \$107.65 was realized for the Chinese Famine Fund. The report also showed that the receipts and expenditures for the year amounted to \$131.73. The amounts were made up as follows:—

The election of officers for the coming year followed, and resulted as follows:— President—Rev. D. Hutchinson, the last Vice-president—Rev. H. R. Read, 2nd Vice-president—Rev. W. Gault, 3rd Vice-president—Rev. W. O. Bennett, Secretary—Rev. J. C. B. Appel.

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered to the retiring president and to the staff. Treasurers were appointed for the week of prayer groups, as follows:— No. 1—Rev. W. F. Gault, No. 2—Rev. L. A. McLean, No. 3—Rev. H. A. Anderson, No. 4—Rev. F. S. Porter, No. 5—J. C. B. Appel, Carlton, No. 6—Rev. H. R. Read, Fairville; Rev. J. Ross, the Rev. W. O. Bennett was elected as chaplain at the Boys' Industrial Home for the first six months of the year.
