Colonel Raymond Lee and Sraff were furnished with a skiff to make their escape. The Colonel gallantly refused, and gave ciders to use it for conveying the wounded across the river. All credit is due to him. Colonel Cegawell took command when Colonel Baker fell, and behaved with the greatest coolness Baker fell, and behaved with the greatest coolness and gailantry. The self-possession, coolness and courage of the men engaged is greatly commended by those who witnessed the contest, and the opinion of both officers and men is that the loss of the enemy on the field was infinitely greater than it was on our side.
