## NEGRO MANIAC KILLED BY INSANE COMPANION

PHILADELPHIA, April 9.—Thaddeus Johnson, a negro maniac in the insane department of the Philadelphia hospital, was kicked and trampled to death today by Patrick Murray, another insane inmate. Johnson suffered from religious mania and was imbaed with the idea that the other patients were wicked and should be disciplined. Seizing a chain Johnson proceeded to correct the other inmates of the insane ward in his own forceful manner. Murray objected to having religion beaten into him, and a furious fight ensued. Murray knocked the colored man down, kicked him in the head until his skull was fractured and then jumped upon his prostrate form, breaking every rib in his body. 
