SEND ANSWER THROUGH MAILED

Remarkable Method of Choosing Candidate Adopted by Democrats of Mass.—Live Session of Committee.

Boston, Mass., Oct. 12.—The Democrats of Massachusetts through their representatives recently sent to the state convention will have another chance to express their preference for a candidate to head the state ticket, by the use of the U. S. mail.

After deliberating for three hours and considering the proposition of Eugene N. Foss, to call another state convention to take a test vote for candidates for governor, the committee decided to send special delivery letters to all delegates accredited to the recent state convention, enclosing return special delivery envelopes in which the delegates may express their preferences for candidates for governor for the guidance of the committee of that to which was given the power of nominating the head of the ticket, but which has been in a dead lock since its appointment by the state convention.

The session of the state committee at its headquarters was a stormy one and frequently the noise of lively debate and demands for "fair play" could be heard outside.

Boston, Oct. 12.—After the decision of the state committee to take a poll of the delegates to their convention became known, both James H. Vahey and Eugene N. Foss, who were candidates before the convention, issued statements. Mr. Vahey reiterated that he was no longer a candidate for the nomination. Mr. Foss declared that he had not sought to make any deal with Mr. Hamlin, and that he would abide by the result of the canvass proposed.

DEATH OF LARGEST CATTLE EXPORTER

Robert Ironside Dead at Montreal After Active Business Career—Had been Member of Manitoba Legislature.

Montreal, Oct. 12.—There died this morning after an illness of about five months Robert Ironside, the largest exporter of cattle in Canada.

Mr. Ironside was born in London, Ontario, of Scotch parents, fifty-six years ago, and as a young man went west where he started the cattle exporting business some twenty-seven years ago.

He became associated with Mr. Gordon, and formed the firm of Gordon & Ironside, which later developed into Gordon, Ironside & Patie, Ltd.

In Manitoba Mr. Ironside was a member of the legislature for a number of years, and was for two years a member of the council of the Montreal Board of Trade.

HERBERT BOOTH TALKS ON CANADA



St. John entertained a worthy member of a world famous family last night in the person of Herbert Booth youngest son of General William Booth, founder and head of the Salvation Army. Like his father Herbert Booth was high in the councils of the Army and did notable work in the ranks of the soldiers who are fighting the great battle of salvation on the broad field of the world.

He has been in Yarmouth and passed through the city on his way to Fredericton where he will tonight deliver his famous lecture on the Early Christians, in the Opera House. While in the city he was the guest of Rev. David Hutchinson, of the Main street Baptist church, and will return here on Saturday to open a campaign in that church on Sunday next.

A Standard representative saw Mr. Booth last night and enjoyed a conversation with him. Naturally the chief interest in the visitor was from the standpoint that he was the son of a famous man, but Herbert Booth would be a noted man even if he had not been born to the purple in the work of the salvation of the world.

Asked in reference to his previous visit to St. John Mr. Booth said: "It was when I was already engaged in the work of the organization I worked out straight in Canada. I volunteered to come and do what I could to help build up the work of the organization from debt and disunion. It has been a great pleasure to me to see so many of my old comrades at my meetings in Canada. My official experience from the organization I worked so hard to help build up has not altered my affection for my former co-workers. God has called me to a wider and larger ministry in which He has been pleased to greatly bless me all over the world."

"I am kept busy and have more calls than I can possibly answer. At this time I have already engagements stretching right to June of next year. Missions in the larger churches between here and the Pacific coast. I have at this moment invitations to several parts of the world, including the Southern States and Australia."

Asked for his impression of Canada after his absence from this country he said: "A New Spirit. The centre of gravity seems to have shifted. When I was here things were most depressing. There seemed to be quite a landslide toward the United States. Canada's young folks were swarming across the border. But now the good old Dominion ship seems to have righted herself. All the bunting is out and the engines are forging ahead at top speed. A new spirit is everywhere manifest. Everyone is buoyantly expectant of a great future. I always felt it must come. An 800-mile ride I once took on horseback through a certain part of the then uninhabited northwest, between Edmonton and Battleford, sent me back to Toronto assured that Canada was destined to be the land of opportunity for the next fifty years. The east is, of course, slow in contrast with the west. But the high tides of Saskatchewan and Alberta are sure to back up to the east before long. I see the signs, and surely the east is as good as any of it. I would rather make a home in New Brunswick than I would in Manitoba any day. The enterprise of the west would do wonders for the east. St. John seems to have gone ahead markedly."

"What do you think of the Christian life of the community, Mr. Booth?" "Ah—now you are asking a big question! The time of this prosperity is in reality the lane of Canada's greatest peril. Hitherto this Dominion has ranked as one of the strong religious communities of the world."

JOSEPH RANGE GOES THIS DAY

Lecture on Life and Voyage of Discoverer at Reception Given by Moncton Council—The Boston Parade.

Special to The Standard. Moncton, Oct. 12.—A large number attended this evening to assist the local council of the Knights of Columbus in their observance of the anniversary of the discovery of America by their patron, Columbus.

The exercises consisted of a lecture on the life and voyage of Columbus by the chancellor of the council, H. F. Hamilton, Hon. F. J. Sweeney, grand knight, occupied the hour and a musical programme was rendered during the evening.

Joint Celebration. Boston, Mass., Oct. 12.—The achievement of Christopher Columbus of 418 years ago received its first holiday recognition in Massachusetts today through a joint celebration by the Irish, Italian, Portuguese and Catholic organizations, which to the number of many thousands marched for nearly four hours through two dense lines of cheering countrymen.

The parade also received national and state approval, for President Taft reviewed the parade from a special stand on the common, and Archbishop William H. O'Connell was also saluted at a special stand near the start.

The day began with high mass at the cathedral, celebrated by Prince Ferdinand De Croix, of Mons, Belgium, one of the staff of Cardinal Vannevel. Later the prince accompanied Archbishop O'Connell to the State House, where the prelates paid their respects to President Taft and Governor Draper. The prince also sat with Archbishop O'Connell in the reviewing stand.

While the parade was the feature of the day, nearly all the local Catholic fraternities kept open houses, and in the evening the city contributed a fine display of fireworks in different sections of the city. The holiday was generally observed throughout the state, having been formally sanctioned by the last legislature.

LAJOIE WAS ENTITLED TO EIGHT HITS

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 12.—Umpire Evans, of the American league submitted a report today to President Ban B. Johnson, regarding the Lajoie incident at St. Louis last Sunday. President Johnson did not make public the entire report but announced that Umpire Evans gave Lajoie an absolute clean bill in relation to Lajoie's making eight hits in eight times at bat in the double-header with the St. Louis team.

Evans who officiated the games in question, filed his report at the request of President Johnson. The report will be made public when President Johnson has completed his personal investigation and is ready to announce his decision. President Johnson is said to have proposed as the best solution of the dispute, that the automatic prize be returned to the donors. That in Mr. Johnson's opinion would end the unpleasant mess, but to reward the players, he would have Lajoie and Cobb's average declared a tie and have the league present a suitable prize to each.



QUARANTINE OFFICIALS GIVING A STEAMER A CLEAN BILL OF HEALTH AT NEW YORK.


WHAT MISSION WORK HAS DONE

Boston, Oct. 12.—Four veteran missionaries tonight reviewed what the American board of commissioners for foreign missions has accomplished in foreign fields.

These veterans, of whom the Rev. Dr. Daniel Bliss was the dean, were among the speakers, at tonight's services in connection with the centennial anniversary of the founding of the American board. While they were addressing an audience that filled Park street church, John R. Mott, chairman of the continuation committee of the world's missionary conference, and Rev. Dr. Chas. E. Jefferson, of New York, were speaking to an audience in Tremont Temple.

Mott's topic was "Missions and Christian Unity," and Dr. Jefferson discussed "Missions and International Peace."

At the Park street church, Dr. Bliss told of his trip to Syria fifty-five years ago, just after receiving his commission as an American missionary. During more than half a century of active service in Syria he has seen his small mission station develop into a thriving college, of which he is the president emeritus, and which has sent out from Beirut thousands of graduates.
