London, Jan. 13-(Through Reuter's Ottawa agency)-À special despatch from Delhi, India, says: "His Excollency, Lord Hardings, the Vicercy, delivered a striking speech before the Vice Regal Council today on the participation of the speech of India. In the war. The galleries of the council chamber wore crowded, and the address of the Vicercy was listened to with the most intense interest. Lord Hardings, at the outset, expressed regret at the participation of Turkey in the European conflict as an ally of germany, and reviewed the events leading up to that event. His Ex-collency proceeded: "I am well aware that many of the leading Moslems of India hat while thousands of Moslems are now fighting in the ranks of the British, French and Russian armies, not a single Moslem exists in the German ranks. 



PULL VIEW OF CONSTRUCTLE FROM THE FAMILIES.GALAIN SERVET Despatches from Rome and Sofia, Bulgaria, report that conditions bordering on anarchy exist in Constanti-nople, with the government officials preparing for flight to Adrianople, which is to be the temporary capital of Turkey. It is declared that the Sultan's advisers believe the fail of the city to be imminent. The populace has been stirred to a frenzy of panic and thousands are leaving for the interior as rapidly as the railroads can carry them. The fright of others, unable to leave, is described as pltiable. The censorship has concealed the nature of the operations of the Allies against Constantirople, but in view of the despatches from Rome it is believed in London that the Franco-British fleet is ready to attack the forts on the Dardanelies and that the co-operation of Greece with a land force is part of the campaign scheme of the Allies.
