

### FINE SPIRIT OF RETURNING CANADIAN MEN

Private Day and Private MacDonald Here Yesterday on Return From War Zone.

Lloyd Day, son of J. W. Day, formerly of St. John, is in the city on his return from the war. He has been invalided home and expects to receive his discharge. Mr. Day was a former student at the St. John High School and has a large circle of local friends. He crossed the Atlantic with the overseas draft from the 63rd High Light Rifles under command of Lieut. Cratton, a Dalhousie student. He afterwards transferred to the 23rd Battalion.

Mr. Day says that the people of England and France are alive to the duty of the hour and are making great sacrifices in order to win the war. He expects to return to Acadia College as soon as his condition permits and will resume his studies at that university. Mr. Day is a brother of Marie Day, the well known newspaper man of Halifax, whose political writings in the Nova Scotia campaign were a feature of the government's campaign.

"I had tuberculosis and I was gassed, and the doctors wouldn't allow me to return to the front, although I made three demands to go back," said Walter MacDonald, a bright blue-eyed lad of sixteen to a reporter at the discharge depot yesterday. MacDonald hails from Dartmouth, Nova Scotia. He joined the 6th Battalion, spent some time at Sussex and Halifax, and then went to England. Transferring to the Tunnelling Corps, he carried out this important work in some instances at a distance of 185 below the surface.

The lad has tuberculosis, but he has the proper spirit and he says he is going to get better. "Then I am going back to take another crack at the Hun," said Private MacDonald.

Hereby require all persons liable to be rated for the year 1917 forthwith to furnish to the Assessors true statements of all their property, real estate, personal estate and income, which is assessable under the Saint John City Assessment Act, 1909, and hereby give notice that blank forms on which statements may be furnished can be obtained at the office of the Assessors, and that such statements must be perfected under oath and filed in the office of the Assessors, within thirty days from the date of this notice.

#### Extracts from "The Saint John City Assessment Act of 1909."

32. The Assessors shall ascertain, as nearly as possible, the particulars of the real estate, the personal property, and the income of any person who has not brought in a statement in accordance with their notice and as required by this law, and shall make an estimate thereof at the true value and amount, to the best of their information and belief; and such estimate shall be conclusive upon all persons who have not filed their statements in due time, unless they can show a reasonable excuse for the omission.

37. Every person, who wilfully or without lawful excuse, refuses, neglects or omits to fill up, to the best of his or her knowledge and belief, any schedule or form as required by any district commissioner, or refuses, neglects or omits to sign and return the same as heretofore required, or makes, signs, delivers or returns, or causes to be made, signed, delivered or returned any false or incorrect answer or statement as to any matter called for by such schedule or form, or refuses or neglects or omits to answer verbally any question which, within the scope of his duties, may be asked by any district commissioner upon any subject as to which any district commissioner is authorized to inquire shall, for every such neglect, refusal, omission, act or default, be liable to a penalty not exceeding FORTY DOLLARS.

38. In case any person knowingly makes any false or incorrect entry, allegation, or answer, or gives any false or incorrect information in the sworn statement required to be made under this Act, or answers untruthly to any question properly asked of him under this Act, every such person shall, on complaint of any assessor or any ratepayer, be liable to a penalty of not more than TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS, recoverable on summary conviction.

43. No person shall have an abatement unless he has filed with the assessors the statement under oath within the time required; nor shall the Common Council in any such case, sustain an appeal from the judgment of the Assessors, unless they shall be satisfied that there was good cause why the statement was not filed in due time as herein provided.

### 26TH OFFICER IN WONDERFUL ACHIEVEMENT

Lieut. Lawson, Nephew of Premier Clarke, Does Daring Work in "No Man's Land."

Still another honor has been bestowed on the famous 26th New Brunswick Battalion, which Lt.-Col. McAvity took to France in 1915. Information reached the city yesterday that Lieut. Walter Cyril Lawson of St. Stephen, a nephew of the Hon. George J. Clarke, had been awarded the military cross for daring exploits at the front. Particulars of the young man's action were also received. The official report says that "he made personal reconnaissance of a mine crater, going across 'no man's land' in daylight at great personal risk. Later he organized a working party and consolidated the crater."

Letters from the front describe the young officer's performance as one of the most sensational of the many daring feats pulled off by members of the 26th. Lieut. Lawson is well known in St. John and his many friends will read with pleasure of his achievement.



AGRICULTURAL SCHOOL, WOODSTOCK, March 12th to 16th, inclusive.

CHATHAM, March 19th to 23rd, inclusive.

The aim will be to make each course as practical as possible and also meet local conditions. This, it is hoped, will go far to insure a full attendance.

As the courses will be short those who purpose attending are urged to make a strong effort to enter at the beginning and remain throughout the course.

But if you cannot arrange to be in attendance during all of a course, don't let this prevent you from being present as much as possible.

The only expenses you will incur are for board and your railway fare as returned rate. Purchase a single First-Class Ticket and secure a Standard Certificate from the Ticket Agent. Railway fares amounting to \$2.00 or over will be refunded by the Department of Agriculture.

As each course will be adapted to meet the conditions of the section of the province in which it is held, separate programmes, for the different courses are being prepared.

### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—85 months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within six miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre.

Duties—85 months residence in each of three years after earning his homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$20.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 30 acres and erect a house worth \$50.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. If stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
