THE LILLIAN H. MUCH DAMAGED.

A cablegram on Saturday stated that the schooner Lillian H., which had been torpedoed, had been towed into Queenstown on her beam ends, with bowsprit and foremast gone and her hull badly damaged. The schooner is owned by shipping men of Parrboro, N. S., and was built at Port Greville. A sister ship, Leonard Tower, was torpedoed on her first trip across the Atlantic.

THE WANOLA FLOATED.

Word was received Saturday that the schooner Wanola, which grounded on Point Allerton, Mass., a few weeks ago, floated yesterday. She was owned by J. Willard Smith at the time of her mishap, but was later sold at public auction. Part of the cargo has been lightered.

SCHOONER LIBELED.

In action to recover wages, Joseph Kelley, John Lane and William Roberts have libeled the schooner J. Arthur Lord, of which craft they formed the crew. The complainants shipped on the craft from Boston for a trip to Shullee, Nova Scotia, to load pling for Boston. On the return trip the craft was forced into Lubeck in an unseaworthy condition. The crew demanded their wages, it being claimed that \$148 was due Kelley, \$118 due Roberts and \$118 due Lane. Not receiving the money, action was brought by libelling the craft.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The side head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made in any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$20.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after securing a vested patent, also 60 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead rights may take a purchase homestead in any of the Districts. Entry by proxy may be made in any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
