Amsterdam, Jan. 11-That the Central Powers have with-

Amsterdam. Jan. 11—That the Central Powers have with drawn their peace terms made public at the Brest-Litovsk confer-ence on December 25, was announced by Dr. Von Kuehlmann, the foreign secretary, in a speech at the Brest-Litovsk conference with the Russians yesterday. Owing to the non-acceptance of these terms by all the energy powers, Dr. Von Kuehlmann said that document had "become null and void." Dr. Von Kuehlmann said the first task of the conference was to resume negotiations at the point where they were broken off at the time of the Christmas adjournment. Referring to the fixed determination of the Central Powers not to accede to the Russian siggestion of transference of the negotia-tions to neutral territory, he said Germany and her allies were not in a position to conduct elsewhere the negotiations begun at Brest-Litovsk, although they were willing to have final formal negotiations carried on and the signatures to the preliminary agreement affixed at some place to be agreed upon after the debate. 

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


