PASTORS "FLOP" ON SPIRITUALISM OF CONAN DOYLE

"Fraud and Freud" Are Given by Rabbi Newman as Two Ingredients of Theory.

New York, April 26.—While Sir Arthur Conan Doyle is absent from the city on a lecture tour which will spread his doctrines of spiritualism in Boston, Washington and other cities, clergymen of various denominations continue to denounce his theories from the pulpits as opposed to the tenets of Christianity.

"Fraud and Freud" are given by Rabbi Louis I. Newman as the two substances of which spiritualism is made. A vigorous denial that the Bible teaches spiritualism also was made from the pulpit of St. James' Lutheran Church yesterday by its pastor, Dr. J. B. Remondy.

"All the appearance from the outer world mentioned in the Bible," said Dr. Remondy, "is the work of the angels, but never of departed men and women. And these heavenly messengers bring no tidings from the beyond, but come to intervene in earthly events."

"The biblical condemnation of spiritualism is strong and decisive. The words of the Almighty are: 'Reverence not them that have familiar spirits, neither seek after wizards; the soul that turneth after such I will cast him off among his people.' The Bible therefore positively affirms the unshakable conviction of God and man that the dead cannot communicate from the other world, and the secrets of eternal life are meant to be hidden from human eyes."

The exposure of Palladino by a group of psychologists a few years ago was recalled by Rabbi Newman in his sermon at Temple Israel yesterday, calling upon "sensible American men and women" to repudiate the theories of Sir Oliver Lodge and Conan Doyle "and the brood of charlatans, mediums and conjurers who shelter themselves beneath the cloak of religion and science."

"The physical phenomena of spiritualism are explicable on the basis of the accredited formulas of psychology, including unconscious impulses, automatism of dissociated personality, as well as the shrewd readings of slight indications furnished by letters at seances," said Rabbi Newman.

"The spiritualism of Lodge and Doyle is an insult to the intelligence of thinking men and women. The Heaven desired by Doyle's address is a pure fabrication in terms of the 'Freudian wish'; it is the mere gratification of human desires in a Paradise of sublimated bodies on the same plane as pictured in the most form of carnal materialism."

The Rev. Christian D. Resner in the Chelsea Methodist Episcopal Church ridiculed in a similar manner Sir Arthur's conception of Heaven, suggesting that it were the material fulfillment of our desires perhaps "that must mean hoots for some."

"It takes a spiritual man to be not made by handling a 'sticky mass of ectoplasm' to interpret the Bible," he said. "Sir Arthur tells us that the most sacred day in the history of the church was the day when the high carnival of mediums and seances. He puts the spirit into the soul as a body for it and then photographs some of the things that he sees. It is forever invisible."

Woman Clergyman Likes Girls' Skirts

Flapper Costume Sensible, Says Miss Royden of London Church.

New York, April 26.—Miss Maude Royden, one of the best known preachers of her sex in Great Britain and pastor of the Guild House Congregational Church in Euston Square, London, arrived yesterday by the White Star liner Cedric from Liverpool to look over American womanhood about prohibition and to deliver a message to the convention of the Young Women's Christian Association at Hot Springs.

Miss Royden, 45, but looking younger, has strictly, as might be expected of one who styles herself an evangelist, and is ambitious to know more about many things, including flappers, before expressing an opinion.

Miss Royden said she had never personally encountered the American flapper, although she had seen photographs, and she was inclined to regard her favorably. She understood that the flapper here wore low heel shoes with spreading toes and woolen stockings and a sensibly short skirted costume. She said she liked this way of dressing.

She deprecated sensation against women smoking because it had a tendency to make them want to smoke. She is not inclined to be severe to women who choose to smoke, is not opposed to dancing except that of the extreme, "repulsive" sort, and thinks women should not obtain divorces unless their marriages are utter failures.

Regarding prohibition, Miss Royden remarked that she wanted "people to be good because they wish to be, not because they have to be." Miss Royden deplored the world "at the cross roads, one going to destruction and the other to a new humanity."

"I am," she continued, "to speak to Americans, I think they have a great duty to perform to humanity because I believe that every movement for humanity's good begins with the mother's love for her child. Then comes the father's love for both, and all three spiritualize the human race."

Miss Royden is the daughter of the Rev. Dr. Richard D. Royden, head and a sister of Sir Thomas Royden, prominent steamship man. The automobile of John D. Rockefeller, Jr., took her to the Y. W. C. headquarters. She was accompanied on the trip by Miss Beatrice Fielding, a secretary of the Y. W. C. A.

EUROPE HEADED FOR DIRE RUIN SAYS CARDINAL

Must Put Aside Hatred and Distrust or Sit in Ruins for Generation.

New York, April 26.—Cardinal O'Connell of Boston, returning on the steamship Arabic after a three months' visit abroad, declared that everyone in Europe wanted America to look forward to a time when the nations of the world would be able to settle things. "Will she?" he asked. "I still cannot answer. Truly, however, what we must find a way to do."

For Europe is clearly at the end of her resources. Either Europe will join all her forces and put aside hatred and distrust, or Europe for a generation will sit in ruins.

"The bravery of Italians in the face of present conditions," he added, "is nothing short of heroic. Everybody looks forward to the Geneva conference with hope, but occasionally I heard the skeptic comment, 'wait and see.'"

Everybody knows that while these mutual suspicions and hatreds and distrusts are kept up, nothing will come but worse conditions—more poverty and more disorder, with possible outbreaks of civil wars. "But who is going to change this attitude of unreasonableness and distrust? It is a moral problem. Who can solve it? The church. But who is listening to the church among the ruling classes? They are listening on the contrary to the stump speeches of every sane man knows to be rubbish."

Cardinal O'Connell described Pope Pius XI. to be "a manly man and one of those rare souls who can be plous and not intolerant."

"I saw the Pope several times," he asserted, "and talked with him at great length. The traits which struck me as the dominant notes of his message were calm and dignified, his voice very calm and deliberate and seems very gentle and yet firm. He is unpretentious. He is open to be influenced and says little. He will not be fanatical nor arrogant. All in all, he seems a wonderful well-balanced character, not led by whims and not to be driven at all."

Cardinal XI. He spoke of his many difficulties, will leave a record of substantial accomplishment—not of ruling classes, perhaps, but of genuine. The cardinal was met at the pier by a large body of New England clergy and laymen. After a brief demonstration he was taken to the Gotham Hotel, where he rested overnight, preparing to return to Boston by automobile today.

PRINCE BRINGS DEMOCRACY TO THE JAPANESE

British Heir Apparent Doing Much to Disperse Clouds of Mysticism in Japan.

Tokio, April 26.—The clouds of mysticism which have surrounded the imperial throne of Japan are rapidly being dispersed through the visit of the Prince of Wales. More progress has been made towards democracy in the people and the imperial family during the last ten days than in the preceding centuries. Genuine popularity may replace power and religious awe.

The Prince of Wales is a human being. His actions force his knowledge into the consciousness of the Japanese. As he pulled a rich rickshaw along the mountain path to Nikko I watched the faces of the Japanese nearby. Their looks expressed amazement, wonderment and secret delight that a prince could be so human.

What the Prince of Wales does is perfect in Japanese eyes, not only because he is an English prince, but even more because he is a friend of their own Prince of Wales. There is every reason to believe the Prince Regent himself looks on the British heir as a model of what a prince should be. His playing golf on the public Miyazaki Hotel course yesterday and doffing his cap to the crowds rather than stifi saluting is more important to the Japanese than the introduction of the jury system or universal suffrage. The imperial family always has had the respect, veneration and devotion of the Japanese people, but the Prince Regent is now winning their genuine love and admiration.

Commodore Perry caused a change in the economic and cultural life of Japan, but the Prince of Wales is bringing about a change in the relation between the sovereign and the people, which is one of the most important factors in Japan's national and international life.

FILM STARS ARE BONDED TO KEEP GOOD MORALS

Taylor's Murder Leads to Insertion of Clauses in New Contracts.

Los Angeles, April 26.—All hope of solving the mystery surrounding the murder of William Desmond Taylor, noted film director, in his apartment on February 4, has been practically abandoned by the police authorities and the members of the film colony. Nevertheless, the case still has its influence upon that colony and seems to shadow many persons whose names are being sharply criticized from the onset and reaching a crescendo of disapproval as it became manifest that many of the most important clues had been obtained by the investigators or disregarded by them.

In addition, practically all of the persons most frequently questioned in the case have left the city, having either been nervous breakdowns. Henry Peavey, negro serving man to Taylor, has fallen upon days of dire need, finally going to San Francisco, where for a time he is expected to be confined to a sanatorium. He has attracted much attention, only to slip into the background again, soon being lost to general notice.
