This company, known as the "Intercolonial Copper Company," has its head of-fice at Providence. Its capital stock is \$2,500,000, divided into 250,000 shares, par value \$10, fully paid and non-assessable.

On the board of directors are a number of the leading business men of Providence and the neighboring cities. The company now owns some 125 acres in fee simple, has license to search over ten square miles, and five hundred and forty acres
