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SOME REMEDY

GREATLY NEEDED

To Relieve Wretched Housing Conditions in This City

High Rents

Surprising Amounts, in Some Cases, Collected Monthly for Houses That Are Scarcely Fit to Live in—What Is Being Done Elsewhere.

That the housing problem in St. John, as affecting more particularly those of moderate means—the workers who have to live in tenements under conditions that are detrimental to health, and to all that tends to a home life such as would be approved by those having the true welfare of the common people at heart, must soon receive increased attention, is evident.

It is thought that there is a change brought to the notice of those directly, or indirectly, financially interested in buildings unit for occupation (and it were difficult to do this in some instances) that there must be a change for the better, even if further legislation should become necessary for dealing with those cases, where voluntary action is not forthcoming.

It is well known that in several places in this city, where rents are high enough to warrant the provision of decent accommodation, there is a condition of overcrowding and misery, resulting from the exactions of certain landlords, their agents and others that call for condemnation. In some cases, it is the tenement is to be blamed, but the opinion prevails that more often the fault lies with those who often take consideration is revenue. It is not unreasonable to suppose that there are some who derive income from unhealthful, ill-ventilated, unwholesome buildings who do not know that they are receiving money from such undesirable channels.

It would be possible to furnish specific instances of wretched housing conditions in St. John that would surprise the tenant, but it would be better to subject one of special study. For various reasons, sometimes because the particular rooming quarters are near to the place where the tenant employs, sometimes because they have become a family landmark, the old stand as it were, people have remained in occupation of such quarters, and it would be well if means could be devised to apprise them of the fact, so that they may be enabled, if they desire to do so, to make inquiries regarding this class of property in which they have funds invested. Reference is here made, of course, principally to those living away from St. John, men who, it is believed, will be concerned in any investment proposition that means discomfort and ill-health amongst the poorer classes.

Wretched Homes.
