Generve. and from the information furniched to us by the Mer. M. Owens. M. Pemberton and others we were satisfied that all practicable measures were being taken for the proper care of the Indian sufferers from small pox and for the prevention of the spread of the disease. will only add in confirmation of the correctness of the impressions we then formed to the above effect that this subject was brought under discussion during the last dession of the Regiolative Council by the sisteret late A! Davie. then Member for Victoria 1 who speaking of his own knowledge. as he had been unremitting in his professional pervices to Indiano, well as to white persons afflicted with small. pos, and who, being one of the medical Officers appointed by Government for this purpose had frequently visited this Meserve on ouch charitable errando. bore testimony to the real and unohinking disregard of the danger of contagion which had been exhibited by those to whom the duty of taking care of the Indiano during the late visitation had been entrust. ed, and especially by Sergeant Bow-
