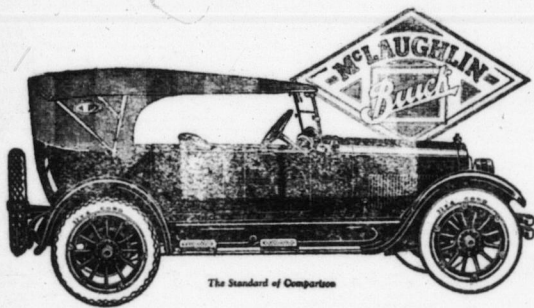

CORONER'S INQUEST

Dr. Freese, coroner, conducted an inquest at the town hall on Monday evening to determine the cause of death of the late Miss Riggs whose body was found on the Wabash railway track a mile east of Glencoe last Thursday morning. W. D. Moss, barrister, examined the witnesses on behalf of the crown. The jury consisted of J. D. Smith, foreman; Geo. Westcott, I. D. Kerr, Gordon Dickson, R. M. McPherson, J. N. Currie and P. E. Lumley.

The engineer of an engine and caboose running westbound light told of his discovery of the body at 8.30. The body was then cold and was lying face down about four feet from the northerly rail, feet towards the ditch.

David Omerod, engineer of an eastbound freight which left Glencoe at 7.05, testified that he saw no living person or body on the right-of-way, but from his position on the engine his view of the track would be obscured six to eight car lengths ahead.

Wm. Gardiner, who lives near where the body was found, met the deceased on the highway half-a-mile west of the railroad crossing at 8 o'clock Wednesday evening when he was driving to Glencoe. Deceased was carrying a large bundle on a stick. In reply to a question she stated that she was on her way to Walter Squire's. Saw body next morning and noted its position.

There was a mark as if body had grazed the gravel for about three feet. Saw footprints believed to be those of deceased in sand on opposite side of track from where body lay leading from the road crossing. These disappeared at places as if deceased had stepped on and off the ends of the ties.

Joe Johnston, section foreman, saw body with bundle lying beside it Thursday morning. Next morning he picked up a set of deceased's teeth and one of her mitts about four rods east of where body had been found. There was a strong westerly wind on Wednesday night.

John Henry, constable, told of removal of body to Glencoe.

J. A. McLachlan had been to house of deceased at 5.45 Wednesday evening. She was then preparing to go, as she said, to visit friends in the country, but gave him an evasive answer as to her particular destination. Had several times cautioned her not to go on the railway tracks.

James Poole, Dan McMillan, Dugald Sinclair, Charles Scott and others gave evidence as to having seen and conversed with her at different points along the road on Wednesday night from 7 o'clock up to 8.30. As far as the first sideroad about 500 rods east of the railroad crossing. She appeared to be rather feeble and was shuffling along at a slow rate.

C. O. Smith, station agent at Glencoe, said there were about four freight and two passenger trains over the Wabash line during the night.

Examination of the body had been made and showed a deep wound to the left of the forehead and a partial severing of the left shoulder.

The jury returned a verdict that death was occasioned from wounds received while walking on the track, and in their opinion that deceased had been struck by a train.

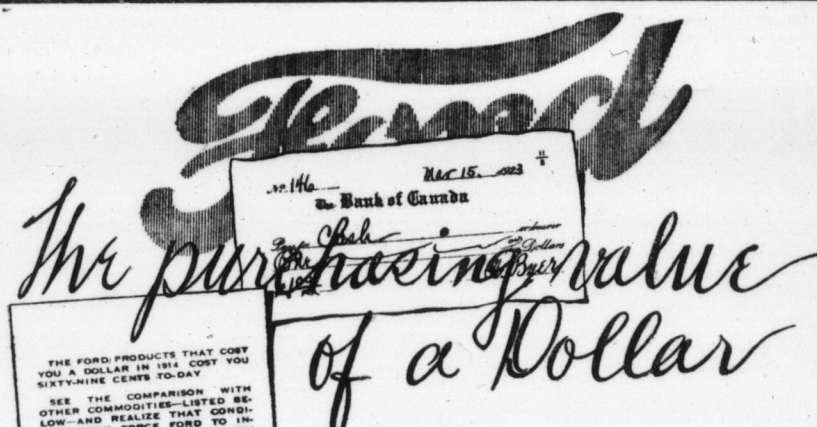
