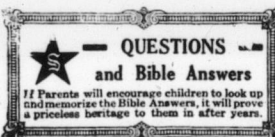

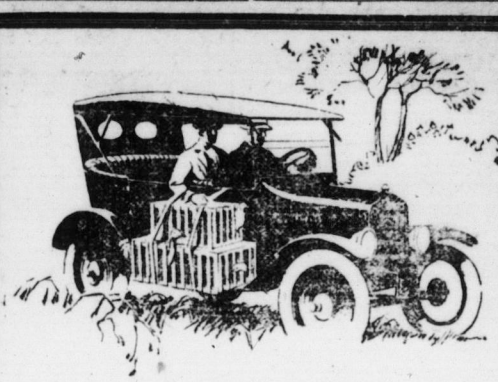
"Who can I do for you?" asked the banker.

So the banker sent for the money, and within a reasonable time there after the money came. There was a courtly gentleman at the other end of the transaction also.—Bpworth Herald.



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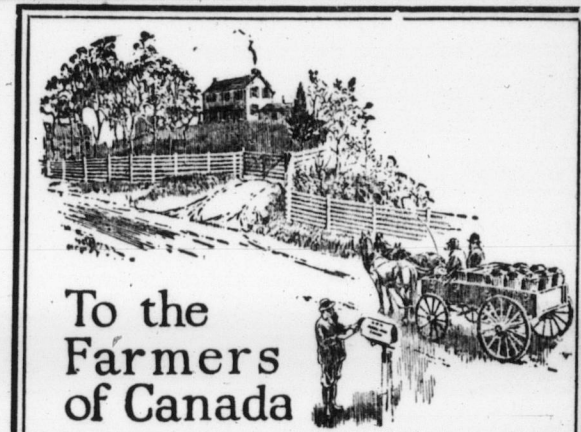
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
