The two sluggers each cracked two crucial homers to spark Cubs to a narrow 26-24 verdict over Astros.

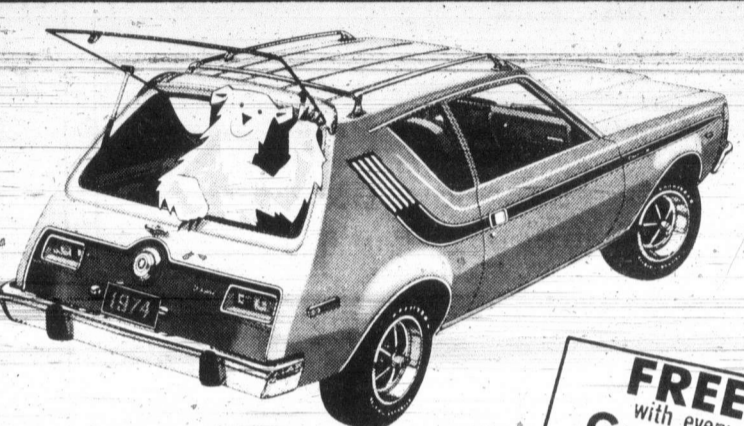
The win gives Cubs a share of first place with Expos.
