 - 27—Land at Southampton. Reception by Mayor. If time, drive through New Forest to Rufus Stone.
 - 28—Motor tour begins. Drive to Romsey Abbey. Winchester: Castle; Mayor's reception; Cathedral, with the Dean; Winchester College. Drive to Salisbury: Mayor's reception; Cathedral, with the Dean.
 - 29—Old Sarum: British, Roman, Saxon and Norman remains. Wilton House, Lord Pembroke's Elizabethan mansion. Stonehenge. Drive via Stockbridge, Odiham, Guildford, Dorking, Box Hill, Ashdown Forest, Uckfield, to Hastings, for tour of the Cinque Ports.
 - 30—Battle Abbey and Senlac Field. Bodiam Castle (fine example of the mediaeval fortress). Rye, Romney, Hythe, Dover Castle, Walmer Castle, Sandwich, to Canterbury.
- July 1—Sunday.—Canterbury Cathedral, with the Dean. Wall, and West Gate. St. Augustine's Abbey (tombs of Saxon kings). St. Martin's, oldest church in England. Mayor's reception.
 - 2—Sevenoaks. Knole House, one of the finest and oldest in England (Lord Sackville's). "Montreal," formerly Lord Amherst's, with memorial obelisk. Westerham: welcome by the Wolfe Society; Wolfe's birthplace, and Quebec House; tea in Pitt's Cottage.
 - 3—London. St. Paul's Cathedral; the Tower; All Hallows Barking, Norman Church. Afternoon, reception by Royal Historical Society.

- 4—Barnet battlefield, to St. Alban's Cathedral; Roman city of Verulam. Hatfield House, Lord Salisbury's palace, where Queen Elizabeth was living at her accession.
- 5—British Museum. Westminster Abbey, with the Dean. London Museum. Houses of Parliament. (Possibly Foreign Office and Downing Street.) Evening Free, for Zoological Gardens, etc.
- 6—Lincoln's Inn. Record Office (Domesday Book). Temple Church and Gardens; Middle Temple Hall. Anglo-American History Conference at Institute of Historical Research. Evening, reception at one of the London Colleges.
- 7—Windsor Castle: St. George's Chapel, with the Dean. Magna Carta Island and Runnymede. Hampton Court Palace. Ham House, Duke of Buckingham's (where Cabal Ministry was formed.) Evening free.
- 8—Sunday.—Westminster Abbey, etc. Drive: by Whitehall, St. James's Palace, Buckingham Palace, Hyde Park, etc. Picture Galleries and Museums. Evening, possibly Greenwich.
- 9—Oxford: Bodleian Library; tea at Colleges; luncheon or dinner at Rhodes House.
- 10—Conference arranged by Prof. R. Coupland, Beit Professor of Colonial History. Visits to Colleges, etc.
- 11—Bath: Mayor's reception. Old Pump Room; Roman Baths; Wolfe's quarters.
