McNabb, and myself arrived at Michipicoten Marbour, Ont., on the evening of the 16th., inst., we were met by The Chief of The Michipicoten Band of Indians and most of the other Indians of ort . that Band, including one Robert Buliere. The Chief was very hostile and abusive to he Indian Agent and they all refused to accept their freaty Money. The Agent enquired in a very frieadly manner what was the matter with them, and Robert Suliere who acted as spokeman for the party, informed the Indian Agent that he was not playing fair with the Indians, se they had asked for roads to be made on the Reserve and nothing had been done in this matter, and that he the Agent was responsible this work not having been done. Suliere also stated that the Agent had sold thei timber on the Reserve and that they had received no money for this cale. Mr. McNabb explained to them that me had sent heir request for roads to the Department of Indian Affairs Ottawa, Ont., and that he had received a reply from them stating that no grant could be made for the building of pade at the present time, also that he had no say in the attor, as the making of roads was a matter entirely in the ands of the Department of Indian Affairs. He explained to them that they had serrendered timber on the Reserve of their own free will to The m lumber Co., and that it was being out on a "Stumpage" is and as soon as the Lumber Co., began to take out the mer the money received from them would be placed to the the Agent, I told them that they had better is and come around in the morning. 8.30 a.m. the following morning they came ocepted their Freaty Money without question quite friendly to the Agent. s enquiries from some of the Indians be hostile and I was informed that ise of all the trouble, also his re was agitating the Chief to at.
