

- Jan. 8. The C.C.L. in a press release, said that it had filed a submission with the Combines Investigation Commission on cartels favoring public or co-operative ownership as the only alternative to private ownership of cartels and monopolies.
- Jan. 8. E.B. Joliffe, Ontario C.C.F. leader, said in North Bay that at the February session of the Ontario legislature, the C.C.F. would demand further information concerning the purchase by Hydro of the Northern Ontario Power Company for \$12,500,000.
- Jan. 9. Tim Buck, National leader of the Labor Progressive party, has announced that he will visit Great Britain and tour European and Italian war theatres.
- Jan. 9. Canada, which entered the war with 40 ocean going merchant vessels, will have six or seven times that number at the end of the war, and will be high in the ranks of world maritime nations, said Hon. J.A. MacKinnon in a review of the wartime growth of Canada's merchant marine.
- Jan. 9. The national executive committee of the Labor Progressive party issued a statement announcing that it has decided to release local party organizations in federal ridings represented by C.C.F. members from a former decision not to nominate Labor Progressive candidates in these constituencies.
- Jan. 9. Lord Reith, former governor of the B.B.C., has been invited by the government to visit the dominions and India to discuss with their governments the future organization of the communications services of the commonwealth.
- Jan. 9. Byelections for Portneuf, St. Hyacinthe-Bagot, Terrebonne, Kamouraska, and Beauce have been called for 23rd of April 1945. (P.C. 145, 144, 146, 147, 148).
- Jan. 10. The Peruvian government has appointed its first ambassador to Canada. He is Alfredo Benavides, until recently the Peruvian Minister in London, Eng.
