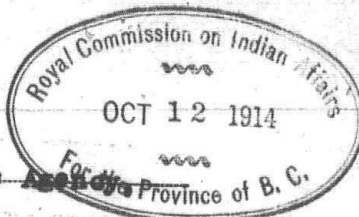

Sir,—

I have the honour to report the receipt of the following, from A. Bryan Williams Esq., J. P., Provincial Game Warden, with reference to his complaint re. Indian Agents acknowledging receipt of copies of Game Laws:

"Sir:—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 31st August, which I am very pleased to receive. Please understand that my remarks to the Indian Commission, with reference to Indian Agents not taking the trouble to inform the Indians of the laws were not meant to be general. I received complaints through the Commission that some of the Agencies complained that they had never received any intimation of changes in the game laws and that there was a great deal of complaint amongst the Indians in various places that they were never notified of the laws. I am quite well aware that some of the Indian Agents do take a lot of trouble in informing the Indians as to what they may and may not do. I also wish to state that I most certainly had not received any complaints of breaches of the Game Laws by your Indians. (Sd.) A. Bryan Williams, J. P., Provincial Game Warden."
