

the land was not worth giving to anyone, but as the Indians had asked for it, he recommended that they be granted 5 acres, where their old houses stood.

Taking up next the Knight's Inlet application: That for Zawadi (A1) was not recommended as these Indians already had 404 acres in their Knight's Inlet reserve, which was sufficient land for all their reasonable requirements in that locality. At Asnaakyl, if they had 20 acres at the mouth of the river they would control the entire valley, which was one big long gravel bar, of no particular use to anyone. The Indians had certain trapping lines going out from this bar, and he recommended that they be granted 20 acres at the mouth of the river falling into Knight Inlet just to the south of Dutchman's Head. Under the Wanias application, he recommended that 10 acres be granted on the south bank of Sim Creek just to the west of Lot 49. The land asked for Wakas was almost precipitous and of no use to anyone, and he therefore would not endorse the application. In any event that land was on T.L. No. 14672. The Hakitum application he also declined to recommend as a reserve inasmuch as that place was almost precipitous, and the Indians in any event would have free use of it for all time to come. As to Hunwadi: The Indians had always been under the impression that that place was one of their reserves. He recommended that two plots be granted them of 10 acres each, the one including the village site and the other being at the mouth of the river -- The village was on Hunwadi Bay and the river came in close; the 10 acres recommended to be given at the mouth of the river would take in both sides of the stream. The part recommended south of the river would be open land and the village part might be found to be covered by Timber Limit No. 14379. That place had long been used by the Indians at least two months in every year. It was there that they obtained the greater part of their

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
