U.S. WAR RISK BUREAU HAVE A VERY BUSY DAY

Washington, October 9.—Chief of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance Delanoy announced yesterday that he was in receipt yesterday of applications for unced yesterday to a total of \$1,034,000. This, he said, was the larges amount of insurance yet applied for in one day since the new bureau was organized. Of the amount ap plied for yesterday at least three-fourths of it was for war risk insurance on cargoes. The large proportion on cargoes is doubtless due to the fact that the bureau was slow to announce what type of cargoes would be insured by the Government.

All cargoes that have been recognized by the helli erent nations as permissible will be insured by the Government without question.
