Dullss. somewhat similar to mid-summer onditions, is now being experienced mongst handlers of woollen and wort d dress goods. In fact, most agents ere marking time, pending some move n the part of buyers. About the most teresting feature in the market the past week has been the naming of adinces on certain lines of imported roadcloths, in cheap grades. dvances named amounted to about 2½ cents a yard on goods seiling be-low the dollar mark. Importers state-that raw material and yarns are just as stiff abroad as they are here. In fact, more so, on suitable grades of wool.

Demand at the present time appears to be centered largely in fabrics suite to be centered largely in fabrics suite able for sport coats and wrays to be worn at the summer resorts, and forzy worn at the summer resorts, and forzy automobiling purposes.
