
JUDGE TRUEMAN PASSED AWAY EARLY FRIDAY

His father, Joseph Trueman, a successful and well-to-do farmer, was a great grandson of William Trueman, who in 1775 came to Halifax, N. From 1868 to 1872 he attended Dal housie University at Halifax, completing a four years' art course and graduating with the degree of bachelor of

After leaving college he taught for two years under a grammar school license in the public schools of the city of Portland, N. B., and from 1876 to 1879 held the position of superintendent of the public schools of that city. Subsequently resigning the position of superintendent, Judge Trueman en-

BODIES OF PORTUGAL'S MURDERED KING AND CROWN PRINCE LAID AT REST

LISBON, Feb. 8.-With the church San Vincent was imposing. The cata- ures of the dead King and Crown bells tolling continually, the bodies of falque was placed about the middle Prince clad in the uniforms they were in two golden chariots, shrouded in black velvet and drawn by eight hooded horses, were escorted by a glittering funeral pageant today across Lisbon to the Portguese pantheon and laid at rest beside their ancestors of the Braganza dynasty. Seven hours elapsed from the time the foreign princes and the special ambassadors of all the powers gathered at the palsalvos of twenty-one guns and three volleys of musketry, reverbrating over the terraced and sunbathed hills and answered by the British warships in the harbor, announced that the last rites were over

Not a single untoward incident marred the last act of Portugal's tragedy. The vague forebodings proved baseless and there is a general feeling of relief tonight that all passed well. in view of the political turmoil. The great outpouring of people along the line of procession was, noteworthy. FROM PORTLAND'S STRIKE

PORTLAND, Me., Feb. 9.—One death has resulted from the strike inaugurated yesterday morning by the 'longshoremen employed by the Maine, S. S. Company, because of the reduction of five cents an hour in their wages. Aama Lavislicisoi, one of a crowd of 120 men employed in place of the strikers to handle the cargo of the steamer Manhattan, was killed while working on the steamer today. He was standing on a raised platform with two others, hoisting freight, when a gear slipped and a rapidly revolving crank knocked him down between the steamer's side and the dock. In falling his head struck against a wooden fender and he sustained a compound fracture of the skull.

He died on the operating table at a hospital. The victim was 24 years old and single. The steamer Manhattan, which should have sailed last night. will not be able to leave for New York hefore tomorrow evening.
