


JUDGE TRUEMAN PASSED AWAY EARLY FRIDAY

Had Suffered From Heart Trouble for Some Months.

Judge of Probate and Lawyer of High Standing--A Companionable, Public-Spirited Man, Whose Death Will be Deeply Regretted--Sketch of His Career

News of the death of A. I. Trueman, K. C., judge of probate, which occurred at his home at one o'clock Friday was heard with great regret by the people of the city and province.

About half-past eleven last night, however, it became apparent that the end was not far off, his pulse being very feeble. Dr. Murray MacLaren, his physician, was telephoned for, and at the end of which time he seemed a little stronger, but half an hour later he passed away, being conscious almost to the end.

Judge Trueman was a man of the highest qualities, and was held in the highest esteem by his conferees at the bar and the public generally, and enjoyed the confidence of his clients to a rare degree.

Arthur I. Trueman, M. A., D. C. L., K. C., judge of probate for the city and county of St. John, was born at Point de Bute, Westmorland Co., on the 28th of July, 1856, a son of Joseph and Janet A. (Scott) Trueman.

On April 4, 1883, he was appointed reporter of the decisions of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, and held that office until December, 1884.

At which institution he had been a classmate of Governor Fisher and Nova Scotia, Dr. A. H. McKay, superintendent of education of Nova Scotia, and number of other prominent Canadians.

For some years Judge Trueman held a commission as captain in the Sixty-second St. John Fusiliers. In religion he was a Presbyterian, and for many years was a member and chairman of the Board of Trustees of St. Stephen's church of this city.

On the 28th of October, 1881, Judge Trueman married Margaret, daughter of the late Hon. John MacMillan, a leading figure in New Brunswick politics previous to Confederation, and afterwards post-office inspector for New Brunswick.

Judge Trueman is survived by his wife and six children, J. MacMillan, recently admitted at-law, W. J. Douglas, who will this year complete his course in mining engineering at Queen's University, Kingston, Ont., A. Harold, of the staff of the Bank of Montreal at St. John, Mary A., Gertrude, and E. Kathleen.

Judge Trueman has been for some time suffering from a valvular heart trouble. Last February, in a vain effort to recover his health, accompanied by Mrs. Trueman, he spent some five months in Europe. For six weeks he was at Bad Nauheim, and received treatment of Dr. Grodel, a world famous specialist, and so far recovered his strength that, on his return from Europe in July he felt able to resume his business. He has been confined to the house for the last nine weeks and notwithstanding a brave struggle which he made to regain his strength, he gradually yielded, and a special meeting of the Law Students' Society was held in the Law Library last night, the President, J. Perley Lunney, presiding.

The following resolution of condolence was passed on the death of Judge Trueman: "Whereas the members of this Students' Society of the King College Law School have learned with heartfelt sorrow that the Infinite God in His Divine Wisdom and Authority has removed from the earth the body of Judge A. I. Trueman across the threshold of some river which separates Time and Eternity, and

Whereas we who day after day sit-ting at his feet, listening to the melodious voice, imparting to us the hidden treasures of the law, have learned to respect him for his high intellectual qualities and broad powers of mind with which he was so amply endowed, and, which he was so amply equipped to carry away with him as a man, a lawyer and a judge.

"And further resolved that we recognize in sorrow and sympathy the terrible loss that has fallen upon his family, and this society extends to Mrs. Trueman and her sons and daughters the fullest measure of our sympathy and respect and hereby direct that a copy of these resolutions be sent to them. It was decided that the society attend the funeral in a body. S. A. M. Skinner and E. S. Ritchie, were appointed managers. The death of Judge Trueman will recall to many who knew him well, the very great friendship that existed between him and the late Geo. W. McInnes, K. C. Both were afflicted in a great measure with the same disease, and for a considerable time the friends of each read the reports in the papers of their sorrowful condition with much anxious interest.

BODIES OF PORTUGAL'S MURDERED KING AND CROWN PRINCE LAID AT REST

LISBON, Feb. 8.—With the church bells tolling continually, the bodies of the murdered king and crown prince, in two golden chariots, shrouded in black velvet and drawn by eight hooded horses, were escorted by a glittering funeral pageant today across Lisbon to the Portuguese pantheon and laid at rest beside their ancestors of the Braganza dynasty.

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San Vincent was imposing. The catafalque was placed about the middle of the church under the dome. The two biers were ornamented with gold embroidery, while the catafalque was of black and silver. Round the base of the catafalque were arranged massive candelabra.

The mourners began to arrive at two o'clock. The special missions took place reserved for them inside the church, attended by bishops, and the massive sarcophagi containing the bodies of the king and prince were being received at the portals. Up the steep, black-carpeted stone steps the coffins were carried and deposited on two parallel biers, a few feet inside the door.

After a brief delay, and without further service, the two coffins were in the Praca do Commercio where the king and prince were assassinated a week ago.

The funeral service in the church of St. Vincent was conducted by Rev. Gordon Dickie. The solemn and representative one. The Mayor and common council attended. The school trustees, the barristers' society, St. John Masonic Lodge and St. Andrew's Society attended each in a body. The pall bearers were Chief Justice Barker, Judge McLeod, C. P. North and John T. McIntyre. Interment was made at Fernhill.

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At the afternoon meeting of the address were short and to the point. In the evening they were more extended, but as fully to the point.

McLean: "Whereas, the Government of New Brunswick is co-operating with the Governments of the Dominion of Canada and the Province of Quebec in reference to the construction of an interprovincial bridge at Matapedia.

Restigouche County Stronger Than Ever for Government

CAMPBELLTON, N. B., Feb. 6.—Restigouche will stand by Liberalism and that means the men who espouse its principles. Never was more enthusiastically displayed at a public gathering in the county of Restigouche than that displayed at the convention of the government party this afternoon, and the same may be said of the public meeting held in the evening. That Restigouche is heart and soul in favor of the provincial government was clearly indicated at both meetings. At the afternoon meeting the addresses were forceful and convincing arguments of the speakers to applaud on every occasion, but as fully to the point.

Moved by John Giroux, seconded by Thos. Craig, "That whereas the present local administration so ably led by Mr. Clifford W. Robinson, has by its progressive policy in promoting the interprovincial railway, which aims at rapidly developing the vast unoccupied territory of the public domain, by its honest administration and its best expenditure which has restored confidence both at home and abroad, confidence in the credit of the province until today it stands second to none of any of the provinces in the Dominion; and

Whereas, the government policy and administration record gives assurance of the annual increasing continuance of the present industrial and commercial expansion; therefore Resolved, that Restigouche county convention renews its expression of confidence in the present administration and pledges itself to spare no legitimate means to secure the election of the candidates nominated this afternoon."
