"The atrocious order had, nevertheless, really been given, and carried out, and proof of it is in the hands of the French government. Over twenty German prisoners of the 112th and 142nd regiments of infantry (forming the Stenger brigade), are now held in

They have declared, under oath, before the magistrate, that this order was actually issued on the 26th of August, and that, in accordance with it, all French wounded found that day were at once despatched. Officers. and notably Captain Curtius, personally, of the 112th regiment, superintended the execution.
