THE PROBS

TORONTO, Nov. 7.—The disturbance which covered Saskatchewan yesterday morning has now reached Lake Superior, causing showers over the great lakes. In the west the weather is cold, particularly in Alberta.

Forecast.

Strong winds and moderate gales, southerly, shifting to westerly and northwesterly; mild, with occasional showers. Sunday—Southwest to west winds, strong to moderate gales, at first mostly fair and colder, with local snow flurries.

MARKET PRICES.

Prices varied on the market this morning. Vegetables were lower and meats remained stationary, while eggs took a decided rise to 38 and 40 cents a dozen. They sold two weeks ago at 32 cents, later rose to 35, and are now going over 40. Butter was bought for 30 and 32 cents. Apples were the same, 15 and 20 cents a basket, and a dollar and one and a quarter a barrel. Good turnips could be purchased at 30 cents a bushel and carrots for 40 cents. Parsnips were 15 and 20 cents a basket. Cabbages and celery went for 40 and 30 cents a dozen heads, and pumpkins brought 10, 15 and 15 cents. Potatoes were 60, 70 and 75 cents a bag. Chickens changed hands at \$1.20, \$1.25 and \$1.15, while ducks ranged 80 and 90 cents each. Grapes brought 20 and 25 cents a basket. Pork was 15 cents a pound.

THAT INCIDENT WHICH CAUSED UNPLEASANTNESS

Stedman Bros. Knew Nothing of Dismissal of the Three Employees.

In connection with the unpleasant incident in a local factory, Stedman Bros., George Street, reported in the Courier last evening Mr. A. A. Wettstein, the superintendent, who dismissed the three men for attending the department of the Brantford troops during working hours, has assured the Courier that he is not a German. Mr. Wettstein says he was born in Switzerland, and is now a naturalized citizen of the United States.

In further connection with the unpleasant incident, it might be said that Mr. George Stedman was absent during working hours, as he was working on piece work at the time, and claimed that when they took 20 minutes off they were slack of work.

Letter From Firm

In connection with the following, Messrs Stedman Bros. have forwarded the Courier the following letter:

Brantford, Nov. 7, 1914.

Editor Courier:

Sir,—An article appeared in your paper of yesterday reflecting on the loyalty of this firm to which we would like the privilege of replying, as we believe the public is fair enough to demand that evidence on both sides be given.

Now, as far as this firm is concerned, we had no knowledge of the incident in question until we were informed that it was to be published in the papers. Now as matters stand, we have not been approached by a single one of the discharged men and we believe any Canadian will be fair enough to agree that the employees should do this, rather than endeavor to hurt our reputation and business as they have done.

If these men desire their positions, they have only to apply for them and we will certainly see that they receive the fairest treatment it is possible to give anyone.
