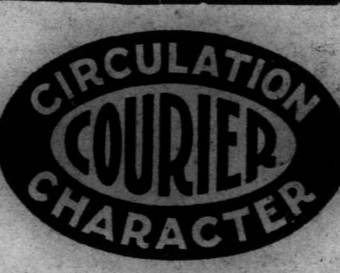

BRITISH GAIN IN PALESTINE

Advance on a Five-mile Front Northeast of Ludd

PRISONERS CAPTURED

London, Dec. 16.—An official statement bearing on the campaign in Palestine says:—

"General Allenby reports that on December 15 his left centre, north-east of Ludd, advanced on a five-mile front to a maximum depth of about one and one-half miles, with-out meeting much opposition. Kibbiyah, Khilabeh, Kich, Dornat and the ridge overlooking El Tirah were occupied.

"Our airplanes dropped 56 bombs on motor-boats and sheds and on troops at the mouth of the Jordan, with good effect, obtaining 24 hits."

140 Prisoners Captured

The Saturday announcement follows:—

"General Allenby reports that he further extended his line northeast of Jerusalem on Thursday, capturing 140 prisoners. Otherwise the situation is unchanged.

"Since Wednesday three enemy airplanes have been destroyed and another has been brought down."

Some time ago through the medium of the newspapers the citizens in general were advised that on account of the great advance in prices and demand of prompt payments by the Wholesale, that unless customers settled their accounts in full either weekly, bi-weekly, or at the end of each month, the retail grocers and butchers of Brantford would have to adopt strictly cash basis. This notice apparently has not been paid much attention.

The Grocers and Butchers have always been very lenient with their customers and many times to their own sorrow. This must be changed if they themselves are to remain in business. No merchant wishes to handle his customers by personally bringing this to their attention, but the Association in general propose to adopt "Cash Only" unless there is a very marked change in payments before the first of the year.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole land of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present year and has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Six months in each of three years after earning homestead patent and cultivate 50 acres extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm labourers in Canada toward the residence duties under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agency Office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.
