THE LABOR PROBLEM.

The strike, as a means of settling labor disputes is rapidly passing out of fashion. Labor and capital both have come to a final realization of the fact that by working in harmony each with the other, their mutual interests are served to far greater advantage than by a continual resort to hostilities. The great strike among the steel workers of the eastern states, followed by the strikes in San Francisco and other Pacific coast centers, has resulted in concentrating the very best thought in the United States upon the labor problem. The trend of sentiment at the present time is in the direction of the establishment of a national commission of arbitration with semi-judicial authority to which would be referred for adjustment all difficulties between laborers and employer.

The natural objection would be raised to an ordinary body of men thus empowered, that the capitalist would be able to exercise an undue influence over their actions.

This objection would need to be met by the selection of men whose public careers would place them beyond the reach of suspicion. Such men could easily be secured and would gladly give their services in a cause so worthy.

While nothing of an absolutely tangible nature has thus far been accomplished as a result of the discussion, it is quite probable that before a great while the matter will take definite form. Strikes have seldom accomplished anything other than hardship and loss to all parties concerned, and frequently the heaviest disaster falls upon innocent sufferers.

It is essentially the spirit of the present age to apply common sense measures to the solution of practical problems. Strikes are an inheritance of a time when brute force was the arbiter for the settlement of all disputes. Modern civilization demands a different method for the adjustment of labor difficulties and it is by no means taking an altogether optimistic view of the situation to say that arbitration will take the place of strikes before the passing of the present generation.

Considering the fact that Winter is popularly supposed to be on his last legs, it must be said that the stern old fellow is displaying extraordinary vitality. It appears that February and March have been some way or other twisted around on the calendar. In any event, the immediate opening of the river is not anticipated.

The city of Ottawa has been sued for the sum of fifty cents. The plain-

tiff in the case alleges that property, to wit: one clay pipe, belonging to him, was utterly and totally destroyed by a mass of snow sliding from the roof of a public building—the unfortunate disaster being due to the carelessness of the city authorities. The United States' diplomatic representative at Constantinople has made demands upon Turkey for the punishment of the brigands who were concerned in the kidnapping of Miss Stone. The Sultan never responds to any other argument.

If our outside friends who are so lavish with their praises of this new country would just turn their efforts toward assisting in securing proper treatment from the federal government, their generous interest would be greatly appreciated.

The delay on the part of the W. P. & Y. R. in issuing the tariff sheets covering the transportation of freight to Dawson for the coming season has a decidedly suspicious appearance. Apparently, the officers of the company will not let up their scheming to retain the old schedule until the very last moment.

Commissioner Ross is scheduled to leave Ottawa on the 10th inst. It is quite likely that something important will be announced in connection with the Treadgold concession either before or very shortly after his departure from the capital.

AIR SHIPS AT FAIR

Big Feature of St. Louis Exposition

Prize of \$200,000 Will Be Given for Most Successful Flying Machine.

St. Louis, Jan. 31.—An exhibition of airships in operation has been determined upon as one of the great novelties for the Louisiana Purchase Exposition of 1903. Messrs. Charles W. Knapp and Nathan Frank, members of the executive committee of the World's Fair, were recently appointed as a sub-committee to consider the question of an aerial tournament to be a feature of the fair. These gentlemen have called into consultation Professor S. P. Langley, secretary of the Smithsonian Institution at Washington, D. C., and Octave Chanute, of the Western Society of Engineers of Chicago, two distinguished scientists, who have given special attention to aerostation. It is proposed to offer prizes of not less than \$200,000. The matters to be determined by the sub-committee and those who have been called upon to confer with them: the recommendation of a chief of the aerostatic display; the rules governing the tournament and the conditions under which the prizes will be awarded. A cablegram from London says that Sir Hiram Maxim, the American inventor, expressed much interest in the proposed contest, and is willing to spend \$100,000 as a participant in the effort to win the prize. President David R. Francis of the Exposition Company says that Mr. Maxim will be invited to participate as soon as the committee of aerial experts has crystallized the plan for the contest. In connection with the tournament there will also be held an aerostatic congress in which the subject will be exhaustively discussed by those who have undertaken practical experiments in aerial navigation. The director of exhibits, Mr. Frederick J. V. Skiff, in making up his classification for the exhibit departments of the World's Fair, some time ago, included in the department of transportation, in group No. 77, provisions for aerial navigation. The group is arranged in four classes. Class 481 relates to balloon construction, fabrics, varnishes, cars, valves, netting, cordage, appliances for stopping balloons, such as anchors and grapnels; the generation of hydrogen and other light gases; captive balloons; the use of balloons for the study of the atmosphere, air currents, clouds, temperatures at great heights, optical phenomena, etc.; drawings, maps of journeys, diagrams, photographs. Class 482 relates to military ballooning; military captive balloons and their accessories; winding drums, transport wagons, apparatus for inflation. Class 484 relates to aerial navigation; dirigible balloons and guiding apparatus; flying machines; screw propellers; aeroplanes and parachutes.

The fourth class mentioned is the one having a particular public interest at the present time. It was early recognized by officers of the exposition that the navigation of the air is one of the great problems for scientific solution, and that this exposition would not fulfill its duty to the world unless it lent its encouragement and furnished an opportunity for those who are skilled in this difficult science to demonstrate the results of their endeavors.

The experiment of M. Santos-Dumont at Paris last year, when he accomplished the feat of sailing in an air ship around the Eiffel Tower and back to the place of beginning, a trip of thirty minutes' duration, all but solved the problem of aerial navigation. The magnificent prize which the Louisiana Purchase Exposition proposes to offer makes the matter one of sensational interest, and the tournament will be one of the most novel in history. Secretary Walter B. Stevens of the World's Fair reports that there is now a prospect of at least 100 entries representing not less than ten countries.

IRISH WILL CELEBRATE

St. Patrick's Day With the Sons of Erin

Proceeds of Entertainment to Be Devoted to a Memorial to the Late Father Judge.

The celebration of St. Patrick's day, the day so dear to the heart of loyal Irishmen and one which in the past in Dawson has been wholly overlooked, will this year be an event long to be remembered, as an effort will be made to do in a small measure make up for the neglect of the past. There are a great many in the city either Irish by birth or descent and a number of the most prominent have taken the matter up with an enthusiasm that leaves no doubt as to the success of their efforts. A committee of arrangement consisting of Messrs. J. R. Grey, John L. Timmins, J. J. Thornton, J. E. Doherty, George McCord, John Mulligan and Martin Gately has engaged the A. B. hall for the 17th, where it is proposed to give an entertainment that will eclipse anything heretofore attempted in that line. The leading professional and amateur talent of the city has volunteered. The promoters of the celebration have another object in view in addition to the mere observance of the day, one that will appeal most strongly to every resident of the Klondike, and particularly the older ones, regardless of nationality and religious affiliation. After the slight expense of the evening is paid the entire remainder of the proceeds of the entertainment will be devoted to purchasing and erecting a suitable memorial to that great and grand man, the late Rev. Father Judge. In respect to his wishes Father Judge was buried beneath the altar in the church which he had erected almost wholly by his own efforts, but there is no

front of the Catholic church on some other place to be agreed upon. Others consider a tablet set in the wall of St. Mary's would be more fitting. At any rate whatever is decided upon will be in keeping with the sentiments, and high regard held for him whose memory it is thus honored.

Early next week the committee will have completed the program it intended to carry out and it is safe to assume it will be such as will honor St. Patrick to be proud of his descendants in this far northland.
