Which First?

A whole loaf for ten cents or a half loaf for a dollar—which do you prefer NOW?

That is putting in plain terms the relative merits of the Hudson Bay railway and the Georgian Bay canal for Western Canada.

The activity of Ottawa Valley interests in soliciting—and in some cases securing—the endorsement of western journals, municipalities and boards of trade for the early commencement and completion of the Georgian Bay canal at an estimated cost of one hundred million dollars, may delay the commencement of the Hudson Bay railway another decade or two.

As you know the Hudson Bay railway will cost about ten millions and harbor improvements about eight millions more; whereas the Georgian Bay canal is estimated to cost a cool hundred million dollars. Moreover, the Hudson Bay Railway will cut the equivalent cost of transportation from Fort William or Port Arthur to seaboard out of existence, while the Georgian Bay canal will at best but cut it in half.

You are of course aware that the finances of Canada will not at present permit the carrying on of both these enterprises at once.

Which do you want FIRST?

Senator Perley.

When the history of the Northwest is written, there will be few names occupy a more prominent place than that of the late Senator Perley. From his arrival in 1882 until his death, he was an active participant in every great movement affecting the West, not only in political life but also in our greatest industry—agriculture.

Coming to the West with considerable experience in political and municipal life, he at once became the leader in his own district and in a brief time was recognized as one of our most forcible and able men. From the beginning he was the recipient of the confidence of his associates, which manifested itself in the many honorable and important offices which he occupied and which he filled with marked ability, always actuated by a sturdy patriotism for the West. A man of strong character and great activity, he was always a firm friend and generous opponent.

The town of Wolseley has lost its first citizen—one who did much toward its development and always had a keen interest in its welfare and progress. Conservatives throughout the province will mourn the loss of a faithful and trusted leader, who remained true to the principles of Canada's Na-

tional Party and whose political career was unstained by jobbery or corruption. One of the last of the Old Guard who sturdily supported Sir John A. Macdonald in his plans for the developing of the Canadian West and imbuing the people with a national spirit, he has passed away with a secure place in the memory of a grateful people.

Fly time is with us again. For every person perhaps it would be wise to keep Mr. Fly out of the house. Here is some information from the Montreal Witness gives out:

"During the spring four hundred flies were collected from various parts of the United States and put through a course of examination. A careful record of each fly was kept and the germs of disease were found to range from 550 to 6,600,000, estimated. In somnolence, blood-poison, malaria, elephantiasis, yellow fever are its allies; swarming in their billions, its warriors have stopped the progress of agriculture, depopulated whole great regions, ruined nations, overthrown the Roman Empire, and the United States alone, the death-roll of this insect army is greater than that of the Civil War.

First and foremost, the mosquito was merely a nuisance. Fat-witted man sitting on the front-stoop of cliff and cave-dwelling, wattle-hut and marble palace, of a summer evening, has cried "Ouch!" smote himself sorely and jibbered that immemorial bromidian: "Well, he won't bite anybody else, anyhow."
