HONORED KING

Grand Torchlight Tattoo Greets Edward at Aldershot-Striking Spectacle.

London, June 14.-King Edward, Queen Alexandra, the Prince and Princess of Wales, the Duke and Duchess of Connaught, Lord Roberts, the commander-in-chief of the forces, and their respective suites, arrived to-day at Aldershot, where the King will review 30,000 troops on Monday The Town Council of Aldershot presented His Majesty with an address in a silver casket. On their way to the royal pavilion, their Majesties reviewed 2,000 to 3,000 school children. The town was gaily decorated with masts and triumphal arches, and was crowded with visitors. A great fea-ture of the royal visit was a grand torchlight tattoo at ten o'clock to-

The torchlight tattoo at Aldershot to-night was one of the most striking pectacles which has been witnessed at England's military centre for years past. The royal party had the benefit of an ink-black night as a foil to the illuminations. Their Majesties drove beneath a succession of blazing arches from the royal pavilion to the drill grounds, where an open marquee, brilliant with electric lights, was used

brilliant with electric lights, was used as the reviewing point.

First came the march past of the English, Scotch, Irish and Welsh bands, encircled by a cordon of torchbearers. In front of the mar'use the bands halted and played an evening hymn, which was followed by music for the drill, in which thousands of torch-pargers marched and countertorch-bearers marched and countermarched in complicated evolutions breaking and reforming in artistic figures. The bands rendered separately a succession of their typical national airs. The bands together then play-

ed the national anthem in company with the bugles. At the end the bugles sounded "last post."

Escorted by a squadron of cavalry their Majesties then retired from the field.

MOVEMENTS OF "COL." LYNCH

His Record as a Boer Officer is Given in Court by the Solicitor General at His Trial.

Defence Says he Will Face th Proceedings Like a Man -What he Did Was Done Openly.

court was crowded to-day. vestigation into the charge of high treason brought against Colonel Arthur Lynch, formerly of the Boer army, who was elected member of Parliament for Galway in November last, and who was arrested in New Haven Wednesday, on landing there from France, was begun. Mrs. Lynch and other friends of the accused were present. The Solicitor-General, Sir ne could estimate just 101 individuals Edward Carson, opened for the prose cution. He referred briefly to Colone Lynch's Australian nationality, residence in Paris, and departure thence to the Transvaal in January, 1900. "The case for the prosecution," said Sir Edward, "will be that on arriving in South Africa, Lynch took service with the Transvaal Government, raised a regiment, of which he acted as commander, to fight in its behalf, and actively fought against Gen. Buller's operations. Lynch was in Pretoria January 15, 1900, and wrote to the Transvaal authorities notifying them of his desire to take up arms. January 18 he signed a field cornet's certificate, describing himself as an Irishman, a British subject, and as born in Australia. But he declared his willingness to fight for the South African re-public in order to maintain and defend its independence. Lynch also took the oath of allegiance as a full burgher, and the certificate enabling him to do so, as well as to accept a commission the Transvaal Government. Lynch then raised the so-called Irish Brigade, joined the invading army in Natal, and issued an appeal, signed Arthur Lynch, Colonel, Irish Brigade. inviting Irishmen to assist the two

The Hon. Charles Russell (second son of the late Lord Chief Justice, Baron Russell of Killowen), representing the defendant, said that Lynch had forced the proceedings like a man. What he had done he had done open-

ly, and he desired to face it in the in-quiry as much as possible. After the police had furnished evidence of the prisoner's arrest, during the course of which Detective Inspec-tor Walsh testified to finding in Col Lynch's pocket a visiting card of Hamilton Holt, "introducing Colonel Lynch, of the Boer army, to three Americans-A. S. Hardy, United States Minister at Berne, Switzerland; Herbert W. Bowen, United States Minister to Teheran (now Minister to Venezuela), and Professor Richardson of the American School at Athens'
-and some testimony had been presented regarding Col. Lynch's presence "on commando" in Natal, the prisoner was remanded to June 21.

INDISPOSED

King Edward Suffering From Chill and Lumbago--Some Public Apprehension.

London, June 15 .- King Edward to day is suffering from a chill which has prevented His Majesty from attending to-day's church parade of the Aldershot garrison. The chill came as a result of his prolonged stay outdoors last night upon the occasion of the torchlight tattoo at Aldershot. His Majesty's chill is a slight one, accompanied by symptoms of lumbago. The weather last night was extremely cold, and it rained at intervals before their Majesties left the brigade recreation grounds. King Edward returned to his apartments, chilled from the unwonted exposure. These re-ports of His Majesty's illness have naturally caused apprehension, but there is apparently no time to antici-pate serious results.

An authentic statement from Aldershot this evening is to the effect that King Edward is slightly indisposed, but that his indisposition is not of a

serious nature. Sir Francis Laking, physician-inordinary to His Majesty, was summoned to Aldershot early this morning. He prescribed for the King, and recommended that to-day be spent in perfect quiet. Queen Alexandra and other members of the royal party attended the services at church, but re-

mained in the royal apartments for the rest of the day. It has been learned that the King arose this afternoon. This is considered a good reason for hoping that his indisposition is only temporary. No official bulletin concerning His Majesty's condition has been issue If King Edward does not attend the review to-morrow the Prince of Wales will receive the salutes of the troop in behalf of His Majesty.

The Court Circular to-night pub-ishes the following official announcement :- "King Edward was unable to leave his room to-day owing to an attack of lumbago caused by a chill." Sir Francis Lakin was in attendance upon His Majesty to-night, and found the King to be much better. The latest expectation is that King Edward will be able to attend the review.
