THIS QUEER SEIGE

Has Lasted for Months Without Result.

Twice Raised but Again Resumed by the Boers—A heroic Little Garrison.

Cape Town, Nov. 27.—The resident correspondence of the Cape Times at Schweizer Reneke, in the Western Transvaal, sends details of the siege of that township by 1,230 Boers, under Commandant De Beer, which commenced at the beginning of August and was still in operation when the despatch left on November 17. The garrison consists of 250 men, under Colonel Chanier, the troops comprise drafts from the Royal Artillery, Somerset, Scottish Fusiliers, East Lancashire, Yeomanry and Cape Police, with two five-inch guns. The garrison was rationed for 35 days, but had cattle sufficient to last till Christmas. Colonel Chanier erected splendid defences, and the whole place was protected by a six-foot wall with gun-turrets. Colonel Settle called at Schweizer Reneke a month ago, when the Boers fled. He continued his march to Christiaan'sburg, where, when the siege was renewed. Fighting had taken place every day, but the walls afford splendid protection, and the defenders had only one killed and two wounded. The Boers twice demanded the surrender of the garrison, but it was scornfully rejected. The enemy once seized the native village, three and a quarter miles distant, but Colonel Chanier ousted them immediately. The Boers are looting the district. The correspondent, Mr. Solomon, who owns a store a few miles distant, says the Boers burned the place at midnight while his wife and children were in bed, and they had a narrow escape. Their tactics appear to resemble those of the Greeks during the siege of Troy, and to be characterized by the same want of method. The Boers are now in a very precarious state, the physicians having no hope whatever of his recovery.

BOY BADLY INJURED.

Leaned on a Gun. When it slipped and discharged its Contents Into His Shoulder.

West Lorne, Nov. 28.—A terrible accident happened on the town line, about three miles east of the village, on Saturday afternoon, as a result of which a fifteen-year-old lad, named Calcott, will, in all probability, lose his life. The Calcotts were cutting wood upon the farm of Mr. Jas. Ross, and the afternoon being rather stormy, work was abandoned, and the boy prepared to go out for a hunt. It seems that he had stopped to rest, leaning upon the muzzle of the gun, the butt being placed upon a log, when the weapon, slipping off, discharged, nearly blowing off his entire shoulder. A doctor was hastily summoned, and it was found necessary to amputate the arm. The lad still lies in a very precarious state, the physicians having no hope whatever of his recovery.

CONVICT WINS A SUIT.

Jury Refuse to Declare He was Legally Dead.

Providence, R. I., Nov. 28.—Martin L. Mowry, now serving a life sentence in state's prison for the murder of Mrs. Abbie J. Reynolds, in Barrillville, R. I., was awarded a verdict of \$4,500 by a jury in the Common Pleas division of the Supreme Court in his suit against the administrator of the estate of Elisha Mathewson. Mowry sued through an administrator, having been declared civilly dead, although he was permitted to appear in court, and testify. He claimed \$5,000 damages for services rendered Mathewson during the last twenty years of his life and also for \$1,000 which had been put into Mathewson's care and which had been given Mowry by a man named Webb, whom Mowry had named during an illness. Counsel opposing Mowry argued that the man, having been sentenced to imprisonment for life, had no legal existence, and therefore could not be considered eligible to bring suit.
