THAT BITING SARCASM.

Every few years there is a general craze for securing the location of some particular line of manufacturing in the small towns throughout the country. Not long ago every little town had by wanted a machine shop of soundry. Scores of these enterprises proved failunes, and are now either closed up or removed and the promoteraleft with a big bonus debt to pay.
